

MARKSMEN TO HAVE INNING FOR TWO DAYS

Marksmen of Klamath county are going to have their outing today and Sunday. The trapshooting at Modoc Point has attracted a lot of attention and shooters are lining up their guns with a view of taking down the handsome prizes that are to be provided.

The schedule as provided is as follows:

There will be four main events each day of 25 birds each and possibly one or two other events afterward. All men will be classified before the events start. A class being 90 per cent and over; B class 80 to 90 per cent and C class 70 to 80 per cent. Inexperienced shooters who average less than 70 per cent will be put in class C, but given bird handicaps of one, two or three birds in each event. All shooters will thus have a good chance at money and merchandise prizes.

There will be merchandise prizes each day for the first, second and third man in each class for the highest totals of the four main events. These prizes will be open to all Klamath county shooters, whether shooting for money or for birds only.

Shooters may enter for money prizes if they desire, each shooter paying \$3 entrance and the pot being divided 40, 30, 20 and 10 per cent to the first four places in each class, the entrance money from each class being divided in that class so that all shooters have about an equal chance.

Of the four main events Sunday, two events will be classed events from 16 yards, and two events will be yardage handicaps, putting the better shooters back according to their previous average.

After the main events Sunday, there will be an event of doubles and other events if desired.

Lunch will be served both days at the grounds.

Tennis Finals to See Americans in Winning Battles

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2.—(United News)—One triumph and one defeat for Americans in the finals have brought the Wimbledon tennis championships to the last day with the chances bright for the United States to carry away a major share of the honors.

In two of the three remaining matches which will determine the all-comers championships for 1926, Americans are favored to win. The men's and women's singles, so frequently won by Americans in the past, are beyond recall.

Howard Kinsey's stout heart and skillful defensive tennis failed against the brilliant play of Jean Borotra, of France, in the final of the men's singles Friday. The "bounding Basque" was in one of his occasional unbeatable moods, and experts who watched the match declared Borotra would have beaten any man in the world.

The Frenchman's triumph was achieved in straight sets 6-3, 6-1, 6-3. Borotra actually eased up in the third set, but the Californian could not take advantage of it. Mary K. Browne and Elizabeth Ryan, playing perhaps the best tennis of their long colorful careers, decisively defeated Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree and Miss E. Collyer of England in the finals of the women's doubles 6-1, 6-1.

WOODLAND TEAM HERE FOR GAME WITH PELICANS

Woodland's crack aggregation of baseball players, considered the strongest on the Pacific coast by reason of that city conducting a farm for the Pacific Coast league, where cubs are seasoned previous to being placed on the firing line, arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday noon preparatory to entering the three-day series of games with the Pelicans of Klamath Falls.

The first game will be played this afternoon at the fair grounds at 2:30 o'clock, and fans are awaiting with anxiety the call of the umpire to start playing.

Pelican supporters should not take the visiting team too lightly. They are seasoned ball players and have been defeating all the strong teams of California, and come to Klamath Falls full of energy and confidence. They feel that they will have no trouble in at least carrying away the honors in at least two out of the three games.

Rip King, captain and manager of the Pelicans, has resigned from the team, and will not be seen in action during the three games that are scheduled. His place behind the bat has been filled with the selection of Eddie Collins, late of the Copper League of Arizona, who comes here touted as a fast player and a good man at the end of a stick.

L. C. Hogle, a pitcher who has been playing with the Washington league, arrived in this city yesterday and reported for duty. Hogle is reported as being a whiz on the mound and will probably be seen in action today.

Eddie Duback, crack second baseman, has been selected temporary field captain for the Pelicans, and if his work and playing proves satisfactory during the three-game series, his position will be made permanent.

The Woodland baseball team is composed of some topnotchers in the national pastime. Seven members belong to the professional class, and have mixed with many of the cleverest men of the diamond. Gabby Fraser, publicity director for the visitors, has played with the Trolley Valley and Northern California leagues. Matra has played during past seasons with the Northern California league; Armstrong was formerly a member

of the Salt Lake team of the Pacific coast league.
