SAN FRANCISCO, July 5—

(United News)—Seattle was the only Pacific Coast league team to win both of Monday's double header and the Indians moved back into third place as a result of the victories. Two mission pitching aces were defeated. Seattle climbed on Cole for a 6 to 1 win in the opener and scored a 10 to 9 victory over Barfoot in the second contest.

The teams finished their eight game series with the Indians ahead, 5 to 3.

Oakland and Los Angeles split their battles against San Francisco and Sacramento respectively, and the Angels, in first place still lead the Oaks by seven games. Both leading clubs took seven of nine games played in the series just ended. Moudy won for Seals in the morning, 8 to 4, while Craighead, late of Fresno high school, pitched the Oaks to a convincing 5 to 2 victory in the afternoon.

Los Angeles belted Keating solidly, 10 to 2 win in the morning and then fell before Kallio and Hughes in a ten inning afternoon game. The score of the second contest was 6 to 3, the Senators scoring as many runs in the tenth as they had in the previous nine innings.

Hollywood and Portland divided their games, Portland taking the series 5 to 4. The Beavers won in the morning 4 to 1, but the Stars took the other game 7 to 4.

YANKS DRIVEN DOWN BY MANY DEGREE MARKS

In the independence day double-headers, Philadelphia was singularly successful against New York teams. The lowly Phils trimmed the Giants in both games 4 to 3 and 5 to 4, while the Athletics, who had waged a very fruitless campaign against the Yankers this season, brought the Hugmen down many percentage points by taking both games, 2 to 1 and 6 to 3.

The St. Louis Browns woke up to win a double-header from the Tigers, 4 to 3 and 6 to 3, while the Senators continued their upward climb in the American league race by annexing both contests from the Red Sox, 7 to 4 and 3 to 2.

Walter Johnson pitched the first victory while Marberry, the sterling relief pitcher went the route in the nightcap.

Two pitched battles marked the Cleveland-Chicago games. The Indians carried off the first, with Leyeson in the box, 4 to 2, but Thomas held them to six hits in the second contest, the White Sox winning 8 to 0.

The National league race was little altered by the flock of games. Pittsburgh divided two games with the Cubs, winning the opener, 4 to 1, but dropping the second, 10 to 7. Five Pirate pitchers were manled in this encounter.

The Reds, leaders in the older circuit, split with the fast moving cards, taking the first game behind Donahue's hurling, 4 to 0, but losing the second 7 to 5 because Rixey, Neff and Lucas were pounded hard.

The Robins continued to show batting paralysis with Jess Petty in the box and dropped the first game to the Braves 5 to 4, ailing stanza.
