When people live healthily and die naturally the assumption is reasonable that conditions are ideal. The high altitude here makes for zip and enthusiasm, and even if the band cannot always be playing we manage to keep step.

Klamath's reputation as a wide-awake town is not without good reason. We are a healthy crowd, and the big preponderance of outdoor work will tend to keep us so.

PLAYING THE GAME

Almost everybody was out-of-town for the holiday, and when one gets sufficiently far away he is apt to run into surprises. Telling someone you are from Klamath Falls is no assurance the other party knows all about Klamath. While railroad developments have given new importance to this section it is a mistake to assume the entire West is keenly interested. There are numerous other places bidding for prominence, and we need always to remember that this is a towering big country.

For awhile yet we must continue a frontier town, and what we may be depends on the headwork we use and the teamwork we show. All any man is entitled to is a fighting chance, and the same may be said of cities. The opportunity is here for expansion but success comes only to those who reach for it. As a community today we are largely a thing apart. As a county we have broad and inviting lands waiting for settlers. As an industrial center we have advantages, but even there we must compete with other sections. It needs to be firmly impressed that Klamath has no copyright on the good things of life, and that millions of acres elsewhere are also bidding for population.

If we want new industries we must hustle for them. If we want more farmers we must cater to them. If we want more compliments we must deserve them. Klamath is a surprisingly busy town now, but evidence is growing that too much is taken for granted. We are not out of the woods yet by a long shot. There is much vigorous work to be done, and so far we have barely begun. The first reaction after the holiday should be to roll up our sleeves and

"go to it" with a vengeance. Just as California must compete with Florida, so Klamath must compete with other Western cities. The entire coast is alive with energy these days and for the present at least we must crowd the other fellow for our share of the "spoils."

PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR

I, Fred R. Goddard, Mayor of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested by Ordinance 554, filed in the office of the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on July 18, 1921, entitled, "An Ordinance providing for the manner of exercising, in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the initiative and referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of municipalities by Section 1 and Section 1 (a) of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, and to enact and amend their municipal charters reserved to legal voters of cities and towns by Section 2 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon," do hereby proclaim that the proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, submitted to the legal voters of said City at a special election held on Tuesday, the 29th day of June, 1926, received the requisite majority vote, entitling the aforesaid amendment to be, and the same hereby is proclaimed as having been adopted.

I, the Mayor, hereby further proclaim that the proposed amendment submitted to the qualified electors of said City at said special election, to-wit: An act to amend the Charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, entitled: "A bill proposed by initiative petition for an act to enact, provide and adopt a Charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said City on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended to date hereof, as follows:

"The Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed for an on behalf of the said City, to lease and sell the bonds of the said City to the amount of Sixty-Two Thousand (\$62,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of paying one-half of the cost of erecting an overhead crossing over and upon the property of the Central Pacific Railway Company, on Sixth street, the proposed structure providing for a twenty foot (20') clear roadway, and a five foot (5') sidewalk on the northerly side thereof, and consisting of two (2) steel trusses, each one hundred and thirty-two feet and eight inches (132'8") in length, supported on concrete piers, together with reinforced concrete approaches, consisting of twenty-five foot (25') spans at both ends, as shown in detail on MWD drawing, number 5294, Sheet 1 of five, dated March 8th, 1926, which drawing or plan is attached to said Ordinance Number 764 and on file in the office of the Police Judge. The total cost of said structure is estimated at One Hundred and Twenty-Four Thousand (\$124,000.00) Dollars, of said amount the said city to pay one-half of the cost, and not to exceed \$62,000.00, and the said Central Pacific Railway Company the other one-half.

Received 1221 votes for and 21 votes against the passage of the same.

That the said Charter addition or amendment having received a majority of all votes cast at the said election for and against adoption thereof, and it further appearing from such canvas of such votes that said Charter Amendment received a total of 1221 affirmative votes, I, the Mayor aforesaid, hereby proclaim that said amendment has been duly adopted by the qualified voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
