Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Bubb and children spent the past week-end at the D. O. Williams ranch at the headwaters of the Williamson river.

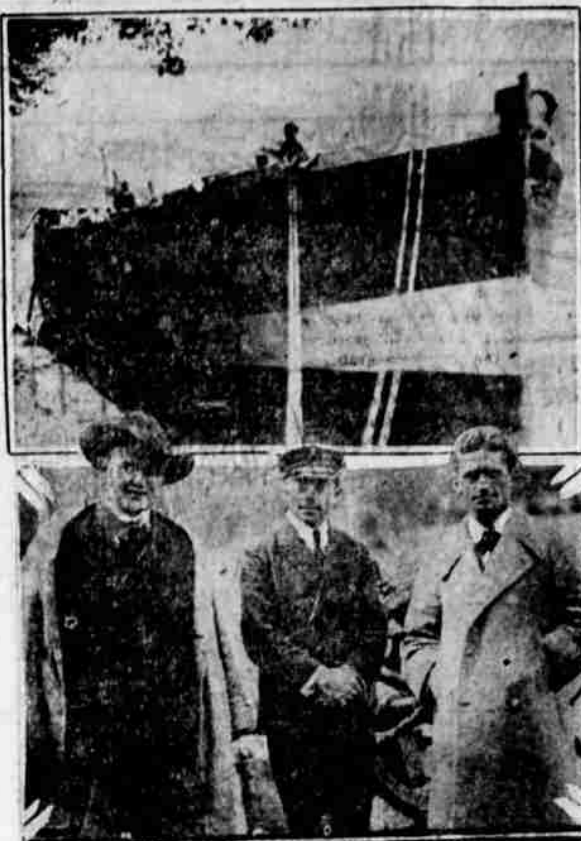

Rain and Wind Is Prophecy For Klamath County

The weather indicator in Underwood's drug store yesterday prophesied rain with winds. It even told of an entire change in the elements for Klamath Falls.

Yet nearly every other section in the county, with the exception of Klamath Falls, has received rain, hail or heavy fog.

According to W. C. Dalton, well known Mallin rancher, the reservoir off Bryant mountain on the Mallin side, that did not contain a drop of water during the spring run-off of heavy snows, was filled to overflowing Tuesday morning following a night's heavy rain as the result of a cloudburst.

"This looks good for the farmers," said Dalton when discussing the strange and sudden downpour. Chiloquin, on the last sight of the celebration, was drenched in all its gaiety, and red, white and blue bunting that voiced the Fourth of July spirit, hung in sorry drapes following the thunder shower.

Resorts are said to have suffered but little from the siege of thunder and lightning of several hours which was followed by rain and hail Monday night.

Of all sections of the county the area near McCollum's mill suffered heaviest. About 750 chickens belonging to the Kessler chicken ranch being killed by a heavy hail-storm.
