

Farmers Smile as Downpour of Rain Hits This Section

A short steady downpour which followed a thunder storm about 4 o'clock yesterday morning, resulted in one-tenth of an inch of moisture falling to benefit Klamath's farmers and ranchers.

According to O. A. Smith, meteorologist of the United States Reclamation Bureau, more rain fell early Wednesday morning than during the entire month of June when only a "trace of rain" was recorded.

Fuses were burned out in hundreds of homes in the city and residents who sought to put down their windows as protection from the storm, had to feel their way about in utter darkness.

Aged Woman Has Success Mining For Elusive Gold

REDDING, Calif., July 7.—(United News)—Far back in the rugged mountain range which parallels the Pacific coast line in this section of northern California, a 76-year-old woman is making her living by wielding shovel, pick and drill in quest of gold.

The woman is Mrs. Emma C. Mable, who has worked a portion of the famous old Brown Bear mine at Deadwood for the last 16 years. The mine was one of the richest in the state, and during its halcyon days yielded twelve million dollars in gold.

Mrs. Mable took a lease on an outcropping vein when the workings were closed down in 1910. She has been following out a narrow stringer of ore which produced \$100 in gold to the ton. She has just had 39 tons milled. The earnings of \$3900 represent a year's work.

Helping the aged woman is an invalid son, but the mother accounts for most of the pay ore dug from the mountain side.

There is nothing dainty about the toll which Mrs. Mable has chosen. It is hard, strenuous work that would test the endurance of most men. It has been estimated that she has taken about \$59,000 from the mine during the years of her lease.
