

GIANTS TRIM REDS IN TWO FAST GAMES

The double victory of the Giants over the Reds, opening the McGraw men's western invasion, featured Friday's ball game.

LATZO WINS ON FOUL IN FOURTH ROUND OF FIGHT

POLO GROUNDS, New York, July 9.—(United News)—Pete Latzo of Scranton, Pa., welterweight champion of the world, won on a foul here tonight from George Levine of Brooklyn, after one minute and 26 seconds of the fourth round.

Latzo had led the challenger for the first three rounds by a good margin and was tearing in fiercely in the fourth when he suddenly stepped back and sank on one knee, claiming he had been fouled. The Timekeeper began counting over him and Pete, his handsome face twisted in anguish, attempted to arise and carry on, but he was helped to his corner.

After a few seconds he was declared the winner.

Many at the Polo grounds booed the decision, but several at the ringside plainly saw the blow and asserted it struck the champion low.

Latzo from the start had demonstrated he was superior to the rather frail looking challenger. Levine kept boring in all the time, but was met each time with a fresh attack.

Latzo landed his right repeatedly to the Brooklyn boy's head and face in the first three rounds. He opened the fourth with a vicious attack and staggered George with a hard right to the chin, just a few seconds before the foul was called.

Latzo was in the midst of a ferocious attack when he claimed the foul and was awarded the decision.
