

### Local Legion Post To Hold Meeting Tuesday, July 20

O. D. Matthews, commander of the Klamath Falls Post American Legion, will call a special meeting of the post on Tuesday, July 20, to elect delegates to the state convention on Coos Bay which meets August 5, 6, and 7.

At the July 20 meeting the matter of holding the state convention in Klamath Falls in 1927 will be discussed. It is understood that Klamath can have the 1927 convention for the asking when the state convention meets next month. Matthews stated, however, that it was doubtful if favorable action would be taken requesting the state convention to be held here in 1927, for the reason that the post has not sufficient money at present, due to the building of the Veterans Memorial, and the further fact that the hotel accommodations in 1927 will not be what they will be in 1928, and also that the rail transportation will be better and more substantial in 1928.

There is a warm contest on over the state among legionnaires in the selection of delegates to the state convention over Joseph Freck and Arthur Murphy. Freck is the commander of the Portland post and for that reason it is said he aspires to be elevated to the state commandership. Murphy is a past commander of the Portland post and since the war has been very active in state legion affairs and has served on the executive committee. It is expected that the big Portland delegation of 22 men will be split in the selection of the state legion leader for the ensuing year, and that the up-state delegates will control the convention by a large majority for Murphy.

The Klamath post will have four delegates to elect on July 20 and four alternates.

### Harry Beall, Vet Spanish-American War, Answers Call

Harry Beall, for the past five years a resident of Klamath Falls, died at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon in a local hospital as the result of a stroke of apoplexy which he suffered Monday of this week.

He had been employed with the Shaw-Bertram Lumber company as a lumber grader since his residence here. Beall is survived by his wife, Mrs. L. T. Beall, and three daughters, Leota, Virginia and Harryette Beall; two sisters, Mrs. J. E. Finell of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Maude Weltner of Kansas City, and one brother, W. H. Beall of Salem, Oregon. He was the son of Dr. H. C. Beall of Illinois.

Beall served in the Spanish-American war as corporal of Co. A, Fourth Missouri regiment, and was a member of the Spanish-American War Veterans in Klamath Falls.

Remains are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home and funeral services will be announced later.

### CULINARY WORKERS INITIATE MEMBERS

At a meeting held Thursday afternoon at the Labor Union Hall several new members were initiated into the Culinary Alliance, among whom was E. J. Stone, of the Owl Cafe. This makes a total number of 226 active members.

The organization was started in September, 1919, and some of the members are in camps and outlying districts. The Alliance hopes to take in the Chiloquin district soon, according to A. F. Duffy of the Culinary Union. Duffy says waitresses were making only \$8 to \$12 a week in 1918, but are now making a minimum wage of \$4 a day and meals.

### Lone Pine Mill Burns to Ground With Heavy Loss

The Lone Pine Lumber mill, owned and operated by the Lorenz company in Klamath Falls, was completely destroyed by fire at 2 o'clock Friday morning, six miles northeast of Bonanza, with a loss of \$50,000. According to Lorenz brothers, the company carried \$17,000 insurance on the mill.

The plant had been in operation but five weeks and was cutting about 25,000 feet of lumber a day. The entire output had been contracted with the Big Lakes company.

According to the night watchman who discovered the fire, the wind did not shift in the direction of the outlying buildings, or the lumber yards where there was more than 1,000,000 feet of lumber the entire concern would have been wiped out.

According to G. C. Lorenz, head of the concern, the company had not decided to rebuild this year but would discuss a plan of buying another plant that could make use of the logs already cut.
