## Brooklyn Robins Advance Another Peg in Pennant

(By United News) Scoring a 5 to 0 victory over the Cubs Monday, the Brooklyn Robins advanced another peg in the National league pennant race. Brooklyn is now in fourth place, formerly occupied by the Cubs. Vance, who was hurt in the fifth inning, and forced to retire from the field, is credited with winning the game, as Brooklyn scored all its runs in the fourth frame.

The Giants presented the Pirates with a 6 to 3 game, after a rally, headed by Kelly's homer in the ninth, had failed. The league leading Reds trimmed the Phillies 7 to 5, with the latter using four pitchers. It was a simple matter for the Braves to beat the Cards 8 to 6, after Welch pounded out a home run.

In the other league the Yankees lost to the Indians and the White Sox beat the Athletics 6 to 2 and 8 to 6 respectively. The Senators trimmed the Browns 7 to 6 after a ninth inning rally. Four pitchers for each team paraded to the mound. The Tigers easily beat the lowly Red Sox 5 to 2.

The positions of the American league teams in the pennant race remain the same as Sunday with New York, Philadelphia and Chicago holding the first three places.

## Grand Jury Will Resume Hearing Minister's Case

LOS ANGELES, July 12.—(United News)—The Los Angeles county grand jury will resume its official investigation of the asserted kidnaping of Almee Semple McPherson Tuesday morning.

Meanwhile, Kenneth G. Ormiston, former Angelus temple radio engineer, and regarded by police as the only man able to clear up the mystery, remains at large, baffling dozens of investigators.

Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Mrs. McPherson, will be the first witness to take the stand. She is expected to substantiate the testimony given by her daughter last week.

Others who will testify include: O. M. Barnard and his wife, of Culver City, who claim they saw Mrs. McPherson driving through that city an hour after she was believed drowned at Venice.

Miss Emma Schaffer, the pastor's secretary.

H. D. Hallenbeck, builder of Angelus temple Bible school, said to have been partially identified as the man seen with a woman resembling Mrs. McPherson at the Club Internationale at Agua Prieta, Mexico.

Clyde de Villiers, Los Angeles aviator, is expected to be a surprise witness at the jury session. He was served with a subpoena late today.

De Villiers called upon Chief of Detectives Herman Cline about two weeks ago and asserted that Mrs. McPherson had been carried away in an airplane from Venice, where she was supposedly drowned. De Villiers, according to Cline, said he could produce the aviator who piloted the flight plane and a check, not yet cashed for \$3000, with which he was paid.

## ANGELS HAVE TEN GAMES TO THEIR CREDIT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—(United News)—Playing the only game on the Pacific Coast schedule Monday, Los Angeles defeated Hollywood 3 to 0 and the Angels lengthened their first place lead to 10 games. Hamilton allowed only four hits.

Oakland, the second place club, entertains Los Angeles across the bay this week. This series is being billed as of the crucial variety, but the difference between the teams takes some of the edge from it.

San Francisco goes to Hollywood and four straight wins would lift the Seals out of the cellar. Portland plays at Mission and Seattle meets the Senators at Sacramento.

## Suit of Ejected Japanese Gets Under Trial

PORTLAND, July 12.—Trial of the first of five Japanese suits against a number of Toledo citizens for damages on charges that the Orientals were forcibly ejected from the town a year ago, got away to an unexciting start Monday in the court of Federal Judge Wolverton.

There were two features to the beginning of what appears to be one of the longest drawn battles in federal court. One was the dismissal of charges against three of the defendants because of inability to locate them and the other was the testimony of Sheriff G. H. Horsfall of Lincoln county.

As the case opened W. Lair Thompson, who, with John Collier, is representing the Japanese, moved that the allegations be dismissed against Emerson, Germer and Buck as they had not been located by the United States marshal's office. Judge Wolverton granted the request.

The usual federal court jury, composed of men from a number of Oregon towns, is hearing the case.

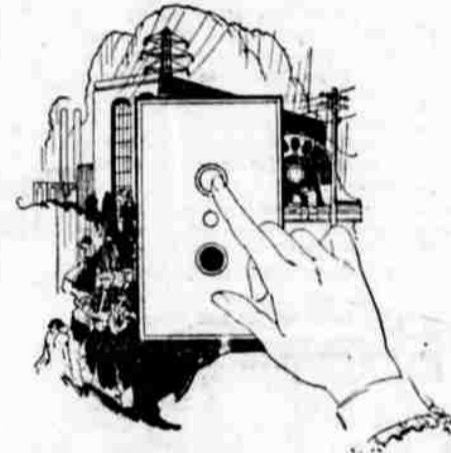
