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AN OBJECT LESSON

Many visitors come to town every Sunday, attracted by the impression that Klamath is booming. We naturally welcome the favorable opinion of outsiders, but sometimes the pendulum swings too far and people stake their all on getting something to do here. Even that should have no serious consequences if favored with youth and strength. This is a fine place to grow up in, but when the years begin to take their toll, the situation is apt to be different.

An elderly couple walked into the News office yesterday with a story of real discouragement. They heard in Portland what a wonderful town Klamath was getting to be, and as they were fortunate enough to own a flivver, it seemed an easy jaunt to the land of their dreams. The car broke down on the steep mountain climbs and had to be towed part way, but they managed to land here Sunday full of assurance. The man was a carpenter, or had been, for his age was completely against him. The wife was a frail piece of nervous energy, who at some time in her career had made things and sold them, and had hopes of doing the same here. It took but a few hours talking around town to convince them that Klamath was not to be captured in a day, and particularly when minus funds. And the reason, which showed at a glance, was their age and disability.

Since part of a newspaper's province is to enter into people's problems, we are able to "set things to rights" and help them on their way back home. That part is merely incidental, but it brought very close to us the near-tragedy in some lives through no one's fault but their own. The most positive thing we know is that elderly people are not as well adapted to "the firing line," and ought not to be so placed. Had they come to Klamath with the intention of developing a small home and possibly growing things, the opportunity would not have been lacking, but when age attempts to pioneer on nothing the odds are almost certainly against. It all goes to show how easily judgment can be misplaced whenever a growing town appears on the horizon.

KEEP MONEY AT HOME

One big protest against Klamath County is that it buys so many things it could just as well raise. Because this is a pay-roll town is no excuse

for sending money away for poultry, eggs, and produce, ignoring really exceptional profits right at our doors. It reminds one of the days when nobody ever thought of nickles or pennies in the purchase of anything locally.

And yet, as this column clearly shows, there are numerous families who would benefit largely by living "on the land." We cannot all be mill-workers and artisans, and not every woman can adapt herself to the stress and strain of every-day business. Down Los Angeles way there are thousands of little farm homes, specializing on poultry and small fruits, rabbits and fancy stock, giving freedom and independence to people who have largely passed their prime, or whose physical condition will not allow the heavier work.

Will someone please tell us why small farming can be so acceptable down there and not up here? There is three times the market in Klamath for all kinds of food products, for the reason that thus far there are no competing sources of supply. Five years hence some people will be literally kicking themselves for overlooking a really safe bet, but so long as human nature remains as it is, life will continue one constant repetition of what "might have been."

\$300,000 HOTEL TO BE BUILT IN CITY

and faced with brick, and will cover a ground space 192x195 feet.

Store Lease Granted
The first or ground floor will contain a large lobby, dining and ball rooms, while already leases have been granted upon the available space for business institutions. A Portland automobile concern has reserved space for display of various makes of cars.

The second floor will contain dining rooms for the convenience of club societies, as well as mezzanine rooms where the ladies may hold club meetings, teas and other gatherings.

The third, fourth and fifth floors will be reserved for hotel accommodations and the rooms will be both single and en suite.

Battery Three Elevators
There will be a battery of three elevators. One will be used for freight purposes and operate from the basement to the top floor. Another will be a service elevator, operating from the kitchen. The third will provide transportation for the guests to the various floors.

In addition each store room will be provided with an elevator from the basement.

The dining room and kitchen are to be the last word in the acme of perfection, and a cold storage department is to be provided.

Furnishings Elaborate
The furnishings throughout the hotel will be of the very latest, and an artistic surrounding will appeal to the most sensitive and delicate of tastes.

The hotel will be operated by R. A. Frazer, a widely experienced hotel man, now making his home at Portland, and a man of wealth, who has already placed orders to the amount of \$25,000 for furnishings.

Construction of this hotel will be by the Bonding Hotel company of Portland, and the financial end of the program has already been completed. Frazer and a number of capitalists, who are interested, are expected to arrive in Klamath Falls the latter part of this week.

Local Architects Selected
Ivan Smith, Oliver Wilson and C. S. Montelius, designing architects, were selected to prepare plans, and they were named as one out of six companies that were considered for this important responsibility.

"We will be able to have the designs so far advanced inside of six weeks that excavation work can be started," remarked Smith yesterday in giving out official announcement concerning the construction of the new hotel, "and we feel certain that the new institution will prove adequate to meet future demands of the city for a period of at least fifteen years."

The ground selected for the new hotel belongs to the Bellman estate, and the location is considered one of the most ideal hotel sites in the city.
