

FANS PREDICT KNOCKOUT IN COMING FIGHT

NEW YORK, July 13.—(United News)—In grim relief against a white splash of canvas at Ebbets field next Thursday, night will be a sprawling figure, while a watchful, excited man in gray bends over, tolling off the fleeing seconds.

Apart, in a neutral corner, poised on the ropes, ready to spring into further devastating action if necessary, will crouch another nearly nude figure, sodden gloves twitching, eyes fixed upon the victim in the blood and dust and resin of the ring floor.

There is little reason to doubt that the Berlenbach-Delaney fight for the light heavyweight championship of the world will end in a knockout before the end of the fifteenth round.

But when it comes to saying which of the two will be prone and helpless upon the damp canvas, counted out beneath the fierce glare of calcium lights while the death cry of the fight fan pack goes up into the night sky—well, that is something else again.

The rapier or the bludgeon—which will deliver the coup de grace?

Will the swift lightning stroke of the panther prevail or will the cumbersome, rib-crushing attack of the grizzly bear prove irresistible?

It is Jack Delaney's cool fighting head, cat-like wave and smashing right hand, against the well-nigh impervious stamina, persistence and pounding left hand of Paul Berlenbach.

A study of men, their plans of battle and the conditions surrounding what is likely to be one of the most enthralling world's championship fights of all time, leads inevitably to belief that the bout will not go the limit.

Either the challenger must get his man quickly—say by the fourth round—shooting his swift left hook to the head and right to the jaw, or else the champion, shuffling relentlessly into close quarters, ought to deliver the knockout within the next seven or eight rounds.
