

JACK DELANEY IS FAVORITE IN COMING BOUT

NEW YORK, July 14.—(United News)—The light heavyweight championship of the world which Paul Berlenbach won from old Mike McTigue on Decoration day two years ago, is due to pass to Jack Delaney Thursday night, unless the unforeseen.

A right hand uppercut to the jaw early in the fight should win for the crafty, light-hearted French Canadian the title he has sought since first he dropped his woodsman's axe and pulled on the leather mittens of his present profession.

Delaney Has Punch
Without detracting one whit from Berlenbach's gameness, stamina and ability to absorb punishment, the fact remains that the champion can be hit, that Delaney can hit, and that a knockout punch must almost certainly end this particular battle.

There is greater interest in this fight at Ebbetts field than ever before has been attached to a bout between light heavyweights.

A gate of approximately \$400,000, is assured by the last minute rush of tickets, which continued far into the night at the Woolworth tower office of J. Humbert Fargazy, the promoter.

Purse Contains Fortune
Whatever happens Berlenbach is assured of more than \$125,000 as his share of the gate receipts—which, after all, is the main consideration among these gentry of the padded fists. Delaney's end will be something over \$30,000, whether or not his flashing right hand knocks the hulking Dutchman out from beneath his crown.

In New York City there is what is known as the "wise money," as the "wise money" goes so go most of the fights. Once in a while the furtive-eyed, loud-mouthed gentry whose habitat is the doorways along Seventh avenue, just above the Rialto are driven to the pawnshops by an unexpected upset. Every so often—but not very often—they "guess wrong."

Delaney Seems Favorite
In this instance the "wise money" is with Delaney. When the fight talk ranges along the bear ringed bars, and rumbles through the cellar speak-easies there is a deal of loud talking about Berlenbach's power, his left hand punch, his tremendous recuperative powers and endurance. But when the "wise money" goes down on the line it is on the challenger.

The odds reflect this sentiment. Delaney will be one challenger who will enter the ring at odds of 6 to 5, or longer.

If the fight goes the limit, as was the case when this pair last met in Madison Square Garden, the champion's greater strength and vitality should pull him through in defense of his title. But considering the calculated fury of Delaney's assault—or even the rib breaking body blows of Berlenbach—the odds are in favor of the bout ending before the last of the 15th round.

Mystery of Woman Found Murdered Finally Solved

BOSTON, July 14.—(United News)—The mystery murder victim, whose dismembered body was found near a graveyard at Mattapan early Tuesday, was identified Wednesday night as Miss Edith Louise Green, 19, a state ward, until recently employed in the Boston Psychopathic hospital.

Announcement that identification had been made came from District Attorney Thomas C. O'Brien only 36 hours after the discovery of the young woman's dismembered body, in three parcels, between Mount Hope and New Calvary cemeteries in Mattapan.

A reconstructed newspaper photograph was indirectly responsible for disclosing the dead girl's identity. Several such pictures which were brought to their attention caused two welfare workers to visit the morgue. They stated the body closely resembled that of Miss Green, who had been missing since June 23, and later made their identification positive.

Radiant in Health, Helen Wills Tells Of Her Success

NEW YORK, July 14.—(United News)—Radiant with health and all dressed up in her Paris clothes, Helen Wills sat on a beflowered divan in the Vanderbilt hotel Wednesday and told about her tennis campaign and talked about her frocks.

The familiar figure of the young Californian, who went abroad in simple white things picked out by her solicitous mother, was set off upon her return to the United States in the smartest of Paris costumes of beige crepe, designed especially for her by Jean Patou. In place of the inevitable eyeshade which is associated with her appearance on the courts, Helen wore a smart little beige cloche, to match her two-piece costume.

"I have not had a racket in my hand since my operation," she said, smiling rather regretfully, "but it won't be long now."

"Mother and I are going down to Forest Hills tomorrow to pick out an apartment, and I start practice Friday afternoon."

If appearances are not deceptive the appendicitis operation performed at the American hospital during the hard court championship at Paris has deprived Miss Wills of none of her strength.

"I got a good rest coming over on the ship," said Helen, adding that she walked three miles every day to get into trim for the coming campaign.

"Of course," she continued, "I cannot say whether my operation has affected me or not until I try out my strokes at Forest Hills."

Miss Wills said she planned to enter two "warm-up" tournaments before the national women's championships at Forest Hills in September. She will play at Longwood, near Boston and at Saabright, New Jersey.

Helen talked modestly and with an excellent display of sportsmanship about her one rival, and her one conqueror, Suzanne Lenglen. She was asked what she thought of the French girl's game.

"All I can say is that she is a really great player; very, very steady," she commented.

The Californian girl volunteered the belief that Miss Lenglen really was ill when she kept the crowd at the center court at Wimbledon waiting, and offended the queen of England.
