

Berlenbach Bout Postponed on Account of Rain

BROOKLYN, July 15.—(United News)—A desolate, drizzling rain drenched expanse of yellow pine seats, row on row, stretching away in every direction from a soggy square of grey canvas to the gaunt grey walls and steel stands of Ebbets field, was all that remained Thursday evening of what was to have been the scene of the Berlenbach-Delaney fight.

Here and there, like wraiths in the lightly falling rain and fading twilight, moved figures of watchmen, the only human beings, where nearly 50,000 had expected to watch what promised to be one of the greatest battles of ring history.

"Rickard luck"—that mysterious arrangement with the weather man, whereby Tex invariably got ideal conditions for his big bouts—didn't hold good in the case of Umberto J. Fugazy, the promoter of the light heavyweight championship fight.

Light showers during the afternoon changed to a steady drizzle by dusk and the bout had to be postponed until Friday night.

With champion and challenger keyed to fighting pitch—nerves on edge, bodies tuned to take and deliver the maximum of punishment—the effect of the postponement is not expected to alter the result.

It may help Berlenbach, who weighed in Wednesday at 174 1/2. Delaney tipped the scales in the boxing commission's office at 166 1/2, and with a day of rest for both the debonair challenger may be spoiling the title holder an advantage of ten pounds.

Jack Delaney's best fighting weight is usually around 171. It is possible that he was drawn a bit too fine for the battle that was to have taken place Thursday, and that he will relish the opportunity to add a few pounds in the ensuing 24 hours.

A fine looking pair, the champion and challenger, as they met and stripped for the weighing-in. Berlenbach, bronzed and clear of eye, with the flash of his face drawn tightly over his high cheekbones, was on the scales when the Bridgeport boxer pushed his way through the crowd.

They shook hands cordially. It seemed for two men who were to do their best to batter each other insensible within a few hours.
