

Pelicans Ready To Trim Ashland In Sunday Game

Optimism over chances for a victory at Ashland next Sunday runs high in the ranks of the Klamath Pelicans, and after a good workout on the local diamond last evening, participated in by 15 members of the Klamath club, the boys declare themselves to be ready to win a baseball game this week-end.

The boy Davidson, who pitched out last Sunday's game with the Ashland club here, is slated for the mound for the return game with the Ashland players on their home sod. Pelican ball tossers have full confidence in the ability of Davidson and say that while the young twirler has not had a lot of experience, he has a great deal of ability and is willing to listen to the wise words of the veterans. This pitcher made a good showing last week when he held Ashland to five runs, after relieving Sylvia. The latter, it is said, is no longer a member of the local team. Dependable Sanders will also be on hand Sunday to puzzle Ashland sluggers.

Duback, crack catcher for the Pelicans, let a foul ball put his hand out of commission last Sunday and will not be able to officiate behind the plate during the coming tussle. The line-up, necessarily changed because of Eddie's hard luck, is only tentative, but it is expected that Freedy will don the corrugated apron Sunday and hold Davidson's stuff, while Duback will play third if his injured hand will permit him to do so. Haynes, former third baseman for the Pelicans, left this week for Portland.

If Duback is unable to hold down third sack in this week's battle, Clark will probably be brought in from the outfield to play first, permitting Aiken to take third base. It is possible that an outsider may be brought in to catch, although no one has been signed as yet. The balance of the line-up will comprise Montgomery at second and Fuller as short-stop, with Matthews and Street, and a probable substitute for Clark in the outfield.

OREGON WOOL CLIP IN HANDS BUYERS

PENDLETON, July 15.—(United News)—Practically all of the 1926 Oregon wool clip is in the hands of buyers, according to Hugh Sproat, executive secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers' association.

About one million out of the 18,000,000 pounds remain in the hands of producers. The average price, he said, has been 30 cents a pound to the growers. Lambs also have prospered, due to the open winter and condition of the ewes and absence of predatory animal invasions.
