

Boy Scouts Win First Prize in Pledge Contest

Bert Shuey, Boy Scout, will probably receive first prize in the campaign for membership of the Stop Forest Fires campaign throughout Klamath Falls, according to a preliminary count last night in the chamber of commerce, when the contest came to a close at 5 o'clock. Bert is credited with signing 660 pledges.

Hubert Totten was rated second place, having signed 556 names; Virgil Tracy third, with 469; James Mitchell, fourth, 400; and Mary Ava Delap, Camp Fire girl, fifth, with 358 signatures.

The Stop Forest Fires committee of the chamber of commerce, with W. E. Lamm as director in charge, is expected to meet this morning and make a final check of memberships turned in and award the five prizes.

Orpheus Offers William Desmond In New Feature

Romance, sorrow and tragedy affect the lives of those who live in the far places just as these emotions affect those who live in places where civilization is on a more advanced plane.

It is of the romance, sorrow and tragedy that came into the lives of men and women in a little logging town in the great timbered expanses of the north that the "Measure of a Man," Universal picture, starring William Desmond, treats. The picture play, which was adapted from a novel by Norman Duncan, will be shown in the Orpheus theater commencing today.

Desmond is cast as a man who has fought his way up from the depths of the Bowery. He goes to a logging settlement with a firm purpose of not only winning to completeness his own manhood, but with the purpose of aiding others in a similar struggle.

The picture was filmed for the most part in the wilderness adjacent to Big Bear lake, in the Sierra Nevada mountains, and giant trees form the background for much of the action. Arthur Rosson directed and the star is supported by an unusually strong cast which includes Albert J. Smith, Marin Sais, Mary McAllister, Francis Ford and William J. Dyer.

There is a prologue, the action of which takes place in the Bowery of New York as it was in the days before prohibition, and special sets for this were constructed at Universal City, one of them being the replica of the old Bowery Mission.

Norman Duncan wrote the story of the woods from a personal knowledge, and Isaac Bernstein, who made the adaptation, picture the Bowery from personal knowledge, for at one time he was a welfare worker in charge of this same famous old mission.

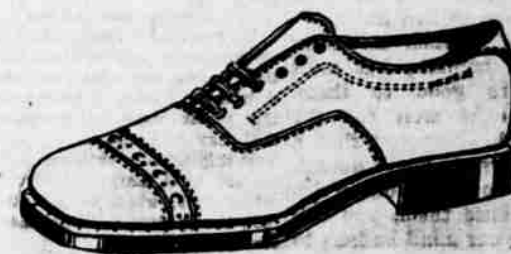
