

Fans Interested In Heavyweights Following Fight

NEW YORK, July 17.—(United Press)—Now that the world's light-heavyweight championship has been settled decisively and satisfactorily by the victory of Jack Delaney over Paul Berlenbach, boxing turns its attention to the heavy-weight division.

Even though there is a belief that Tex Rickard has decided upon a match between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney which he will promote in September, despite opposition of the New York boxing commission, it is not certain that Dempsey will fight this year, and if he does come out of retirement, it is a pure guess to name his opponent.

Billy Gibson, manager of Gene Tunney, who returned this week from the California movie lots, insists that Rickard has made a match with Dempsey for his boxer and that they will meet "some place" in September.

Rickard has been silent on his plans for some time, and he refused to discuss the situation today. He admitted, however, that he did not want to waste any interesting information when it would be crowded out of prominence by all the publicity that preceded the Delaney-Berlenbach match, the first real successful outdoor show that has been promoted in New York since his Dempsey-Firpo battle.

Rickard also does not wish to antagonize the commission more than he has done so far and he has no desire to tip off any plans that might be used to advantage by rival promoters.

Paul Berlenbach's announcement that he was through with the light-heavyweight class and would box in the future only as a heavy-weight, is sure to give Rickard something to think about. Berlenbach said he had to punish himself to make the weight for Delaney last night, and there is no doubt—not taking anything away from Delaney—that Paul did not fight his usual fight.

Berlenbach didn't cry aloud about his misfortune in losing the light-heavyweight championship. On the other hand he may consider it a stroke of fortune. He got \$150,000 as his end, and if he had retained the title he would have been forced by the commission to fight at 175 pounds and there are no more \$100,000 opponents in that division.

Free from the annoyance of commissions and challengers, Berlenbach can now fight when he pleases and whom he pleases, and he is still a great card.

On the other hand the new champion will have to fight Mike McGuire and a raft of antiques or second raters.

McCormick Asked To Give Account Missing Jewels

NEW YORK, July 17.—(United Press)—A chapter which might have come out of the Arabian Nights, involving a kidnapped beauty in a sultan's harem and the theft of rare jewels, threatened also to involve Harold F. McCormick, head of the International Harvester company, if the amazing story spun in the office of a New York firm is upheld.

The story is told, not by Queen Scheherazade, but by Goldstein and Goldstein, attorneys.

It is to the effect that the harvester king is shortly to be called upon to account for the jewels and property of a young Turkish girl who is alleged to have lived in McCormick's Chicago home up until a short time before her death last spring.

Sidney Herman, husband of the late Carmen Herman, has obtained a summons against the well known millionaire, demanding an accounting of personal property consisting of stocks and bonds of the International Harvester company of Illinois, trunks and luggage at number 1609 Lake Shore drive, (McCormick's home) deeds and title papers to lands in Turkey and jewelry; as well as bonds of a Spanish steamship line.

A hearing has been set for October 19.

Pasadena Whippet Race Is Captured By Tuck O'Drum

SEATTLE, July 17.—(United Press)—Tuck O'Drum, four-year-old racing dog, weighing 25 pounds, owned by Walter Freeth, Jr., Pasadena, Calif., won the first whippet dog race ever run in Seattle today, by covering the 200 yard course in 12 seconds flat.

Tuck O'Drum went across the line first in the finals ahead of Sloe Eyes and Arroya Ben Jerry, owned by Freeman Ford of Pasadena, Calif., and Edna Brownie, owned by W. A. Coull, Vancouver, B. V.

Seven thousand people witnessed the races in University of Washington stadium. Eight preliminary races, and two semi-finals were on the program.

The races were run with 25 lb. animals on the starting mark, with lighter animals given a handicap of half yard for each half pound under weight.

Arroya was the only dog at the 25 pound in the finals. Sloe Eyes had a six yard handicap, while Tuck O'Drum and Edna Brownie were 10 yards ahead.

Arroya Ben Jerry led the field in the first semi-final with Edna Brownie second in 12 seconds flat.

The second semi-final went to Tuck O'Drum with Sloe Eyes second, also a 12 flat heat.

More than two score dogs were entered in the Derby.

Speed Record Is Broken by Hartz At Atlantic City

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 17.—(United Press)—Harry Hartz won the 120 mile classic at the Atlantic speedway today and broke the world's record for cars with a 91 inch displacement. Hartz covered the course in 58 minutes, 20 2-5 seconds, at an average speed of 123.4 miles an hour.

Fred Comer was second, Norman Batten third and Phil Shaffer fourth. The best records these small racing cars have made in previous meets were from 117 to 119 miles an hour.

Hartz took the lead at the start of the race and never was overtaken, although Cliff Woodbury, who finished fifth, had been close for the first 71 laps.
