

Tom Mix Injured In Filming New Colorado Picture

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Colo., July 17.—(United Press)—Tom Mix, movie actor, is recovering tonight from bruises and a "shaking up" he received this afternoon, while filming a picture in a canyon near here.

Mix was on top of a train. Just before the train went into a tunnel he was to grab the guard and swing free, letting the train pass beneath him.

According to the plan, as soon as the train had passed into the tunnel and the scene taken it was to return so that Mix could drop back on it. The plans were misunderstood. Mix hung on the guard as long as his strength lasted and then fell to the ground 20 feet below. His legs were bruised and he was forced to discontinue work for the day.

Mix, with a company of actors, has been here a couple of weeks, making a film depicting a train robbery.

Mimic Battle of Fighting Ships Begins Today

SEATTLE, July 17.—(United Press)—Fifty fighting ships of the United States battle fleet, manned by 12,000 bluejackets and officers, will engage in a great mimic battle on the strait of San Juan de Fuca, beginning Sunday morning.

Steaming out from anchorage behind Ediz Hook, Port Angeles, the battleships, destroyers, scout cruisers, submarines and train vessels that compose the nation's first line of defense, will enter on a vast tactical maneuver involving the defense of Puget Sound, which will end next Friday, when the sea fighters come back into Puget Sound to visit various ports.

Hero of Arsenal Explosion Buried With Full Honors

NEW YORK, July 17.—(United Press)—A marine trumpet blew taps as a flag-draped casket, bearing the body of Private John Wilson Monroe of Richmond, Va., killed last Saturday in the Lake Denmark naval arsenal explosion, was lowered into its grave in the national cemetery at Cypress hills.

Monroe was buried as military heroes are buried. Marines from the Brooklyn navy yard carried the casket from the naval hospital morgue to the chapel, where Chaplain Commander J. W. Moore conducted the funeral services.

Buddies of the dead marine, some of them wearing bandages which covered the wounds received at the explosion, came to pay homage to a fallen comrade.

Monroe was believed to be one of a group of marines who fought the fire at C-31, the magazine at the Lake Denmark arsenal which contained TNT. After the first explosion he and a number of others, realizing the danger to the entire arsenal, rushed to the storehouse and attempted to quell the blaze.

The entire fire fighting force was wiped out when the magazine blew up.

WOMAN IS GIVEN LONG PRISON TERM

BELLINGHAM, July 17.—(United Press)—One to twenty years in the Walla Walla penitentiary was the sentence imposed upon Mrs. Maud L. Boede, when she pleaded guilty today to forgery.

She cashed worthless checks to the amount of \$410 since last November in this city and Gray's Harbor county.

PASTOR LACKS MEMORY

NEW YORK, July 17.—(United Press)—Charles Himes, who described himself as pastor of the Presbyterian church of Hanley, Pa., was freed when arraigned on a charge of stealing a pair of baby shoes from a department store. He pleaded that since an attack of typhoid fever he suffered from lack of memory.

Santa Fe Musters Freight Cars For Moving Wheat

TOPEKA, July 17.—(United News)—To move the bumper wheat crop from the broad lands of Kansas, the Santa Fe railroad is mustering into service every available freight car in its system; bringing some of them from points as far east as Chicago.

F. C. Fox, general manager of the Santa Fe, said tonight that within the last few days 2500 additional box cars had been called throughout the system. They are being rushed into the wheat belt.

"These cars have been collected from various points," Fox said. "Although we have handled more wheat since July 1 than in any six weeks' period in history, the freight car shortage is not serious. We are now able to return to the wheat, two empty cars for every car that leaves with a load of wheat."

Fox said the Santa Fe is trying to distribute the cars as evenly possible.

SOUGHT MURDERER HELD IN ST. LOUIS

KELSO, Wash., July 17.—(United Press)—John W. Smith, whose real name is said to be John Owen, wanted here on a charge of first degree murder for the death of Thomas Dorey, Kelso editor, is under arrest at St. Louis, Mo., according to advices received here today.

Dorey was murdered during the course of a bitter political campaign, June 19, 1925.

Policy of Funding Debt Is Creating Feeling in Europe

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(United News)—This government's debt funding policy is creating so much anti-American feeling in Europe, as intimated in dispatches from United News foreign correspondents that officials here are disturbed.

There is resentment here that democratic newspapers should comment on the situation to make it appear that the administration has, by making exaction of France, has permitted Great Britain to outmaneuver it with a more friendly settlement which has the effect of concentrating all ill-will on the United States.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon left Washington today for Europe, ostensibly to motor on the continent and visit his newly married daughter in Rome.

But it is hardly possible that the directing mind of the American debt funding negotiations can go into Europe when the debt discussion is at such a critical stage without discussing it with French representatives.

Even here he has been importuned with arguments, and it is hardly possible to suppose that he will refuse while in Europe to see French representatives who will desire to present their case. Were he not prepared for this he probably would avoid the embarrassment of having to refuse to talk with this country's debtors by remaining at home and foregoing until some more auspicious time the pleasure of visiting his daughter's new home.

PARIS, July 17.—(United News)—France defeated Sweden in the semi-finals of European zone Davis cup play Thursday, winning three straight matches.
