

Pelican Players To Be Augmented By New Timber

If Manager Eddie Dubeck's plans work out satisfactorily in the three practices which the Klamath Pelicans are having this week, local baseball fans will be greeted with some drastic changes in the Pelican club in field next Sunday when the boys meet the Medford club on Klamath soil. "I'm going to try changing the boys around to different positions," Dubeck declared, before leaving for the field last night, "to break this jinx which has been haunting us for the last five games. And you can tell 'em that if we don't come out of Sunday's game with the heavy and of the tally to our credit, Klamath Falls can draft a new ball club and not meet any opposition at all, from us."

The local club is crippled up pretty badly, and, in fact, several of the men have been carrying injuries for the past four games. Davidson, who has been exhibiting a sweet brand of pitching ever since Silvia, his predecessor, evacuated, had the misfortune to get clipped on the ankle with a fast ball last Sunday at Ashland, and has been confined to his bed with the injury, all week.

He'll be on the mound next Sunday, however, according to Dubeck, who says that the new tosser can't be held down with anything short of a major operation. Dubeck stated that he would very much like to see Jack Frane, a local boy, given a chance to catch for Pelicans Sunday.

"I'm all for giving the home talent every possible chance," the manager declared. "We've tried importing ball players all season and so far most of them have either blown up or else proved to us in a few minutes that they didn't even know how to get into a uniform." If the Pelican club doesn't get Frane, Dubeck will probably be slated to catch, and with his finger still bandaged, the latter is a little dubious as to the job's attraction.

The local club lost the other two games played with Medford, but in spite of the successive losses piled up by the Pelicans during the last few weeks, the local boys still have a good chance to tie for first place in the league by winning five out of the six games ahead of them. Dubeck is enthusiastic over the support received from Klamath fans. "They follow just as close when we lose as when we are winning, and believe me, all of the players appreciate the fine support."

Fight Syndicates Sparring Hard to Stage Big Fight

CHICAGO, July 21.—(United News)—Two powerful fight syndicates, one headed by Tex Rickard and the other by Bill Clements, president of the Chicago Coliseum club, claim to have clinched a heavy-weight championship bout for Chicago in September.

Rickard says he is virtually certain that within the next 24 hours he will be able to announce completion of negotiations for a fight between Jack Dempsey, the heavy-weight title holder, and Gene Tunney, the leading white contender.

Clements says that his club has been licensed by the new Illinois boxing commission, and that it has contracts for a fight here in September between Dempsey and Harry Wills, the dusky choice of the New York commissioners.

In event Rickard attempts to put on his show it will be enjoined by the courts, according to Doc Kront, who is associated with Clements in promoting the Dempsey-Wills bout.

Rickard claims that the Coliseum contract has been nullified by failure of Clements and Krone to pay Dempsey \$100,000 last March. Krone, however, says the contracts have been modified and that a payment of \$300,000 is due August 5.

Both groups of promoters are after Soldiers' field which has a seating capacity of 150,000. Thus it would appear that the long tangle over the next heavy-weight championship bout is as much a snarl as ever. Here is what the leading promoters say:

Take your choice:
Rickard, "negotiations have gone so far that there is not one chance in a thousand that they will fall through. The Dempsey-Tunney match will come off either September 15 or 18. Tunney will be here August 1, and Dempsey is ready to come on from Colorado Springs just as soon as I send for him."

Clements, "I was called before the Illinois boxing commission and licensed to do business in Chicago. I advised the commissioners my first business would be to file a permit for a Dempsey-Wills fight at Soldiers' field in September. I have advised Jack Dempsey to appear in Chicago not later than August 6 to begin training. Tickets will be distributed through the Hotelmen's Association out of Chicago. Rickard is out of luck once more."
