

American League Scramble Brings Indians to Front

The Cleveland Indians pushed the Athletics out of second place in the American league scramble for runner-up Thursday by defeating them 4 to 2.

In a free hitting encounter the first inning of which started with Gehrig pounding out a home run, the Yankees defeated the White Sox 13 to 10, giving them an eight game lead over the Indians in the junior circuit procession.

The Browns broke a tie in the ninth inning to beat the Red Sox 5 to 4, while the Tigers were unable to make hits count and lost 13 to 9, to Washington.

In the older circuit Chicago lost to Philadelphia, 6 to 4, and St. Louis was beaten by the Giants 5 to 3. Chicago and St. Louis, therefore, continue to be tied for third place.

The Pirates overwhelmed the Robins in Pittsburgh by a score of 14 to 2.

Rickard Program On Fighting Not Taken Seriously

NEW YORK—July 22.—(United News)—Tex Rickard's announcement that he would stage a heavy-weight championship fight in Chicago between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney some Saturday afternoon in September failed to draw a rise out of the New York boxing commission at today's meeting.

The subject was brought up officially and buried finally, according to a brief announcement.

Muldoon withdrew the motion he made at Tuesday's meeting that the Dempsey-Tunney case be re-considered. James A. Farley, chairman of the commission announced.

Muldoon, who has been waging a minority fight to permit Dempsey and Tunney to fight in New York, said that his point had been lost when Rickard announced the fight was to be staged in Chicago.

The commission begged to be excused from answering questions from the press, but Farley said that no punishment against Rickard had been considered.

"Are you writers sure that Dempsey and Tunney are going to fight in Chicago?" Farley asked. "I have not heard or read that the Illinois commission has issued a license."

Farley ridiculed the idea that the New York boxing commission might get in trouble for forcing a fight out of the state that might mean a loss of \$100,000 to the state treasury in taxes.

"The public doesn't figure what the state would lose in the difference between the tax on the receipts of a fight between Dempsey and Tunney and one between Dempsey and Wills, that the commission has been trying to force," he said.

"The complaint about the loss of business that would be suffered by New York hotel men and theatrical producers if the fight goes to Chicago is pure bunk," Farley continued. "The business interests of New York are now unable to take care of normal business."
