

## Siskiyou Players Ready to Combat Claims of Henley

The battle Sunday between the Golden Rulers and Dorris will give some idea of the probable outcome to the pennant of the Klamath Siskiyou Timber league. Dorris is the champion of the Siskiyou county section. Henley is champion of the Klamath division. They will meet soon for a three-game series for the cup.

The games of the Klamath county division may not be played to completion, as the horse racing at the fair grounds a week from the coming Sunday prevents the Golden Rulers from playing a double-header of postponed games between Pelican City and Malin. ## Season's Record Hits Are Made in Pennant Leagues

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 23.—(United News)—Two Pacific coast golfers will fight it out over the White Bear course tomorrow afternoon for the cup which goes with the winning of the western amateur golf title.

The finalists in this event are Frank Dolp of Portland and Ben Stein, Seattle, both of whom won notable victories this afternoon. Dolp disposed of Kenneth Hiest of Chicago, 9 and 8, while Stein was putting away Rudy Knepper of Chicago, 5 and 4.

Dolp and Stein encountered stiff opposition, for Hiest is a two-time big ten champion, while Knepper once held the Iowa state championship.

Dolp outplayed his opponent by a wide margin. He trimmed him in driving, approaching and putting, and terminated the match on the tenth green when the hole was halved in par fours.

Victories of Dolp and Stein made it a sweeping triumph for Pacific coast golfers who entered the western amateur this year for the first time.

Rickard claims to have Dempsey signed up to fight Gene Tunney here in September. Clements claims to have Dempsey signed up to fight Harry Wills here the same month.

Attorneys for the two promoters are sparring for a knockout, but thus far both contracts remain very much on their feet.

In event the contest begins to drag it may be transferred to one of the local courts of justice, where a regularly authorized "referee" can decide the winner.

Clements says Rickard can go ahead with his bout plans if he wants to, but that he may find himself stopped cold on the day of the fight by a restraining order. But Rickard doesn't go in for heavy losses of that kind. He prefers to wait and see if the issue can't be decided by the Congress hotel preliminary.

### BUZZ ARLETT, OAKLAND SLUGGER, IS SOLD

OAKLAND, July 23.—(United News)—Buzz Arlett, slugging Oakland outfielder, will wear a Brooklyn uniform next year if the plan of Larry Sutton, Dodger scout, materializes.

Sutton is working on a deal that would take Arlett to the Superbas in exchange for George Boehler, former coast league pitcher. Boehler would report to the Oaks at once, but Arlett would finish out the season here.

Two other players and \$25,000 in cash are said to be included in the deal.

Arlett is batting .387 this season and has gathered 19 home runs.
