

Timber League Is Ready to Disband Present Season

Invasion of the southern section of the Klamath-Siskiyou league, for the second time, the Golden Rulers beat Dorris Sunday in a thrilling finish game by a score of 5 to 4. The thrill was two out, two on, second and third, with Al Brotherton making a big league catch of a line drive off his shoestrings after a hard run. The first invasion, Decoration Day, the Golden Rulers beat Macdool 15 to 5.

Barhop, porridge star for the champions of the southern division, pitched fine ball, allowing but seven hits. He struck out four, Maguire twice, Brotherton and Stewart each once, and walked one.

Jones, for the Golden Rulers, with a well controlled spitter and a variety of speed, whiffed twelve Dorris batters while being touched for nine safeties.

With Louis Stewart on third and Harry Kellis back at short, Mason at second and Bennett at first, the Golden Rule infield once more was a baseball playing hunch.

In the Klamath division Algoma took Henley to a cleaning by the score of 10 to 8. Lemmelly, Algoma pitcher, was in extra good form, striking out 18 Henley batters, according to reports. The game was played at Algoma.

This finished the Klamath-Siskiyou league season, except for the pennant games between Henley and Dorris, and the two postponed games, Pelican City and Malin with the Golden Rulers. Chiloquin's ball club has vacillated. The last two games were forfeited, the week before to Henley, last Sunday to Pelican City. Chiloquin's team, according to one report, disbanded, because of not getting any money for the celebration games played, and lack of support.

PELICANS IN LINE FOR FIRST HONORS

The Klamath Pelicans staged a heavy comeback Sunday when they defeated the Medford ball club to the tune of 13 to 9, incidentally letting themselves in for an excellent chance to cop first honors in the Southern Oregon baseball league. Both Klamath and Grants Pass were slated to lose in the Sunday scuffles, but with the tables turned, fans in all four directions are wondering how baseball standards are going to fly after the games this week-end. The same teams pair off for games Sunday and if the wins fall the same way, the local team will be tied with Ashland for first place in the league.

SIX IS DEATH TOLL SUSPENSION BRIDGE

CHARLESTON, W. Va., July 26.—(United News)—Search of Coal river at Whitesville, where a suspension bridge collapsed Saturday night, hurling 75 to 80 persons to the stony bed of the shallow stream, ended today.

No additional bodies were discovered. Major E. O'Connor, commanding the state constabulary at Charleston, announced that the death total was six and that 33 were still in hospitals, revising the original official statement of troopers in charge of rescue work that 13 had been killed.

Poison Liquor Death List at Buffalo Grows

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 26.—(United News)—The poison liquor death list of Buffalo and nearby cities, which has been mounting at an enormously steady rate during the past few days, reached 36 tonight, when it was learned that four more men had died after drinking the supposedly high grade liquor.

Two died at Lockport, one who had gone blind died at Hamilton, Ontario, while the death of a fourth, who died Friday and was buried today, was traced to the poison.

It has become known that much of this liquor, guaranteed as the "real stuff," had been smuggled into Canada and then from Canada back to the United States. It was synthetic whiskey made from cheap and poisonous alcohol.

Buffalo police and federal investigators are trying to locate James Voelker of Buffalo's north side, to learn if he was a distributor of liquor in Buffalo and western New York.

Senator Reed Is Probing Illinois Senate Election

CHICAGO, July 26.—(United News)—After learning that at least \$300,000 had been spent in the Illinois senatorial primary inquiry, the senate "slush" committee today baited its head into a flat refusal by Colonel Frank L. Smith's manager to reveal the names of certain contributors to Smith's successful campaign for the republican nomination.

Allen F. Moore, whose work prior to the April election was largely responsible for Smith's victory over Senator William B. McKinley, told Senator James A. Reed, chairman of the committee that he did not care to give the names of all the contributors.

"All right," said Reed, "you are excused temporarily, but I want you to ask Mr. Smith if he wants to take the responsibility for refusing to disclose contributors to his campaign."

Conspiracy Charge Is Filed Against Nine at Portland

PORTLAND, July 26.—(United News)—A total of nine men have been arrested for prohibition conspiracy, it became known today as three were arraigned in federal court. Those arraigned today were:

Joe Bucker, who operates a dairy, and was charged with permitting the Roy Moore gang to operate a still on his property, was held under \$2000 bail.

C. J. Dakloff, arrested for having a still and alleged to be a member of the Moore gang, was held under \$7500 bail.

The other man arraigned was Antoine Litzler, also charged with permitting the Moore gang to operate a still on his property. His bail was set at \$2000.

Moore was the government's principal witness in the trials against Arthur Christensen and Roy and A. C. Smith, former dry agents.

Stanfield Clears Status of Money Coming Counties

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(United News)—The efforts of the Portland Oregonian to minimize the value of his tax relief measure to the 18 Oregon counties, Senator Stanfield said today:

"An Oregonian editorial of July 19 states that advances made to 18 Oregon counties under the O. and C. relief law is chargeable against counties' participation in sales as provided in the Chamberlain-Ferris law.

"This is a mistake. The moneys advanced by the federal government of the 18 counties is in lieu of taxes based on the taxable value of the grant lands as of 1915. Applying rate used by counties and districts for each year's taxation purpose the sum advanced by the federal government to the counties is chargeable against the entire fund and will be reimbursed to the federal government from the entire fund and the residue after reimbursement will be distributed between counties and reclamation fund, as provided for in the Chamberlain-Ferris law.

"The increased values in lands and timber and accretions in timber growth may, at time of reimbursement to the federal government equal or exceed the amount of money advanced to the counties in lieu of taxes."

Master Mind of Bootleggers Is Declared Guilty

NEW YORK, July 26.—(United News)—William V. Dwyer, the silent, spectacled "master mind" of a \$40,000,000 rum ring, has been found guilty of conspiracy to violate the Volstead act after one of the most sensational trials in the history of prohibition.

C. C. Cochran, one of the seven named as defendants with Dwyer, also was found guilty by a federal jury late Monday night, while six of the alleged conspirators were acquitted.

Judge Mack immediately imposed sentence. Dwyer was sentenced to two years imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000, the limit allowed by the law. Cochran received a sentence of two years imprisonment and a fine of \$5000.

France Insists Volstead Act Is Cause Her Plight

NEW YORK, July 26.—(United News)—The Volstead act which deprived France of one of its greatest sources of income is the cause of anti-American demonstrations in Paris, in the opinion of Philip G. Peabody of Boston, an economist and philanthropist.

Peabody arrived Monday from Europe, convinced that the French regard the prohibition law as a hypocritical measure, which ended a prolific source of American revenue.

The French, he said, considered American demands for debt settlement as the result of the loss of liquor revenue in this country.

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Emancipator's Son Dies; Family Name Is Thing of Past

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(United News)—A short, stocky, whiskered old gentleman, with an aristocratic lift to his eyebrows was found dead in bed in a New Hampshire cottage today, and the family name of Abraham Lincoln had passed from the world of the living.

Robert Todd Lincoln died, carrying with him many intimate facts about his father, for he would never write the story that only he, could tell.

Lincoln lived here for many years but to the people of the capital he was a legendary figure.

The son of Abraham Lincoln not only avoided contacts, he shunned them.

Robert T. Lincoln, was present at Ford's theatre when his father was shot. Later, as secretary of war, he arrived at the railroad station here just as Garfield was shot. He was only a short distance away when McKinley was wounded at the Buffalo exposition.

Lincoln's son was secretary of war under Garfield, and Arthur, and later ambassador to London. But thereafter he kept aloof from public news. He might have been president. Friends planned to take his name before the republican convention in 1885, but he declined to be placed in opposition to President Arthur.

GANGSTERS HURL BOMBS; SLEEPERS NOT WAKENED
