Freight Rates on Cascade Division Show Reductions

New Southern Pacific freight tariffs, naming local rates between Portland, Eugene, Salem and other points in western Oregon and points on the new Klamath Falls line, have been mailed to the interstate commerce commission and the public service commission of Oregon. The tariffs will be effective September 1, that being the date on which freight service will be inaugurated over the new line. The tariffs are now being distributed to agents and shippers.

While the tariff work has not yet been completed, everything is in readiness and it is with a considerable sigh of relief that the labors of several months are well along to accomplishment, according to J. H. Mulchay, assistant freight tariff manager. It has involved a revision and amendment of approximately 199 freight tariffs and circulars, requiring printing of almost 500 pages of rates.

Mulchay states, however, it to be only a beginning—that despite the effort to anticipate and provide for all reasonable contingencies, the opening of a new line of railroad and particularly one so important as the Klamath Falls line, involves many complications.

Rate clerks, agents and the entire railroad personnel must become acquainted with new stations, distances, ratings, routings and traffic conditions.

Traffic managers, shipping clerks and traveling representatives of shippers also will find considerable work on their hands, as the new line so changes the present rate conditions in the Klamath Falls territory that a complete revision of shippers' schedules will be required. The rates are all on an equal mileage basis, and on account of distance favoring Portland it can be readily seen that this city has considerable rate advantage. Rates from Portland now are materially higher than from California on account of the 100-mile greater distance from Portland than from San Francisco, the new line reducing the distance, making Portland 86 miles less than San Francisco.

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Northwest Forest Fires Are Reported As Under Control

PORTLAND, July 28.—(United News)—Aside from fires in the Chelan and Colville reserves of Washington the fire situation in the Pacific northwest is well in hand, E. N. Kavanagh, assistant district forester, reported today.

The blaze on Drake creek in the Chelan reserve, which has already burned over nearly 9000 acres and the 17-mile creek fire which ruined 19,000 acres of timber in Colville Indian reservation before spreading to the reserve, are flaming uncontrolled. Another blaze on Boulder creek in the Chelan reserve, was reported to be about half controlled.

Kavanagh estimated that the total acreage burned in the Chelan reserve to be 25,000 acres. No estimate was available as yet of the damage in the Colville reserve.

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Insane Woman of Oregon City Is Murderess Mother

OREGON CITY, July 28.—(United News)—Mrs. Charles Warren, 28, who shot and killed her mother, Mrs. Melissa Bolton, 73, is insane and has been insane for some time. It was announced today by Dr. Frank W. Wallace, Clackamas county health officer.

The woman shot her aged mother fatally at the Warren home in Klamath, one mile south of here, shortly before midnight Tuesday. Mrs. Bolton died from the 'bullet wound which penetrated her stomach, early Wednesday morning.

Two shots were fired, the first one arousing neighbors, who feared to enter the home. Then a second shot rang out and Sheriff Mass was summoned. He found the house barricaded and upon forcing entry found Mrs. Warren guarding the prostrate form of her mother.

Mrs. Bolton was a widow and had made her home with the Warrens for some time. Warren, a railroad man, was not home, but two small children were in the room where the tragedy occurred.

When a person applies for credit, the merchant or business man calls up the Credit Bureau and asks for their rating.

To sum it up briefly, the manner in which you pay your bills today determines whether you will be granted credit tomorrow.
