

Husband of "Ma" Says Klan Cause Of Her Defeat

DALLAS, Texas, July 28.—(United News)—It was the Klan and the "monkey faced Baptists" that defeated "Ma" Ferguson in the democratic gubernatorial primary, according to her husband, former Governor James E. Ferguson.

While the victorious attorney general, Dan Moody, today was cutting down the slight vote that separated him from a majority standing, "Pa" Ferguson came out with a statement explaining it all. It was in the form of a letter, published in his weekly newspaper, "The Forum," and it was entitled: "How It Happened."

After ascribing the defeat of his wife to the silent force of the Ku Klux Klan and the Baptists the former governor said that regardless of personal feeling "my wife and I are desirous and hopeful that Attorney General Dan Moody's administration may be one of service to the people."

"Pa" said nothing about the promise made by his wife to resign her office immediately if Moody beat her by one vote, and her refusal to keep it until after the special session of the legislature.

How to Proceed in McPherson Case Baffling Officers

LOS ANGELES, July 28.—(United News)—Authorities investigating the Almee Temple McPherson case, claiming to have positive evidence disproving the evangelist's kidnapping story, do not know what procedure to follow, it was believed here tonight.

After a three hour conference between District Attorney Keyes, his deputy, Joe Ryan and Detective Chief Herman Cline, the case was as much in doubt as ever.

Terminating the session at six o'clock, Keyes' only statement was: "I have nothing whatever to say. I will not make any statement until I have a complete report to make. I am not just sure what this evidence is, and do not wish to make any comment until I have thoroughly gone through it."

Neither Ryan or Cline would comment on the affair upon issuing from Keyes' private chamber.

President Calles May Confiscate Church Property

MEXICO CITY, July 28.—(United News)—President Plutarco Calles of Mexico is considering action against the three clergy based on charges that they are inciting the people to rebellion. In making this statement the secretary of interior referred particularly to abandonment by Catholic priests of their churches Saturday, a means of retaliation against Mexican religious laws.

The president is said to take the position that this action of the priests tends to cause popular unrest in Mexico and thus works for rebellion.

Telegrams were sent out by the secretary of the interior Wednesday, instructing all mayors to appoint committees for taking over the churches when they are abandoned Saturday. The order stated that the church properties, which had a total valuation of \$300,000, would not be turned back to the priests, once the government found it necessary to take charge of them.

The confederation of Mexican workmen is planning a large demonstration Sunday to show its endorsement of the governmental attitude in the present controversy.

Underbrush Fire Causes Families To Flee Homes

SEATTLE, July 28.—(United News)—The underbrush and slashing fire which threatened thirty homes in the Lakeview addition, just south of the city limits here, was believed under control late this afternoon.

The flames caused occupants of six dwellings to flee, leaving their personal effects behind, and destroyed several garages.

Picked up by a miniature whirlwind which swept off Lake Washington and into the blazing district, Louis Smith, 15, was injured. The boy was lifted five feet in the air. As he fell a bucket of water, which he was carrying to fight the fire, struck him on the head and knocked him unconscious.

TROPICAL HURRICANE ON FLORIDA COAST

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 28.—(United News)—Almost completely isolated southeast Florida was tonight repairing its storm damage, expected to run into the millions as the terrific tropical hurricane which has wrought havoc on land and sea for four days worked slowly up the east Florida coast toward Jacksonville.

The disturbance was reported southeast of here late today and was expected to strike this section, perhaps a few miles of Jacksonville tonight. The fate of several vessels, reported in distress in the storm area and today, was still undetermined tonight.

The storm is believed to have taken its heaviest toll in the Palm Beaches, and in that vicinity high winds and water caused heavy damage to the fashionable ocean front, and are believed to have sunk more than a score of yachts and houseboats at Palm Beach and Lake Worth, near by.

Communication with the storm area was virtually impossible today and details of the extent of the damage are still meager.

Wind of gale force, accompanied by a driving rain, has blown in Jacksonville throughout the day.

Widow Rev. Hall Held on Charge Of Killing Him

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 28.—(United News)—Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall has been arrested in connection with the murder of her husband, the Rev. Edward Hall, and his choir singer, Mrs. Eleanor Mills, at New Brunswick on September 14, 1922.

Early Thursday morning, Mrs. Hall was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Sutphen at state troopers' headquarters and was held without bail on the murder charge, for the grand jury.

The Hall-Mills murder case for several years had been regarded as a crime seemingly to remain unsolved.

The elderly Mrs. Hall had gone unsearched throughout the vigorously conducted inquiry for months after the bodies of her husband and Mrs. Mills were found beneath a crab apple tree on the Phillips farm near New Brunswick, nearly four years ago.

Aviator Indicted On Manslaughter Charge at L. A.

LOS ANGELES, July 2.—(United News)—Carroll B. Crossan, 30, pilot of the airplane that killed two 13-year-old girls on the sand at Venice a week ago, was indicted on two charges of manslaughter today by the county grand jury.

A coroner's jury at the inquest over the bodies of the two children last week returned an open verdict, recommending further investigation.

Though Crossan claimed his engine stopped while the plane was about 1000 feet in the air and that he landed on the only possible spot on the strand, other witnesses brought out that he had been cautioned several times for low flying and stunt aviation.

PRISONERS TO PEN

MEDFORD, July 28.—(United News)—Deputy sheriffs left Wednesday with seven prisoners for upstate institutions. Two of them, James Gregory and James Morgan, go to the penitentiary for two years for car theft; James Court and Harry Douglas to the state reform school for petty stealing; two girls, Jane Wilson and Robert Tarren to a Portland institution for girls and William King to the state insane asylum.

PROMOTER INDICTED

LOS ANGELES, July 28.—(United News)—Indictments charging him with use of the mails to defraud were voted against E. G. Lewis, Atascadero promoter, by a federal grand jury today.

With attorney Louis Cohen, H. L. Kramer and William Aherns, his alleged associates, Lewis was said to have defrauded 8000 investors in the California Illustrated Review, promotion of which forms the basis of the indictment, of \$550,000.

First Shot World War Fired Twelve Years Ago Today

GENEVA, July 28.—(United News)—Tomorrow the twelfth anniversary of the firing of the first shot in the world war finds Great Britain, France and the United States in the order named, spending the most per capita each year on preparations for future wars.

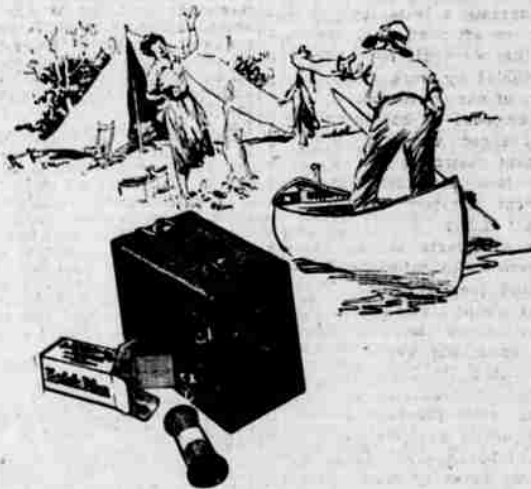
Great Britain leads the world powers in her average annual appropriations for armaments, statistics show. Her average annual output, including military, naval and aerial budgets, is \$573,000,000 or \$12.96 per capita. France follows with an average annual expenditure of \$255,000,000 or \$6.43 per capita, while the United States, spending on an average of \$554,000,000 or \$4.44 per capita, ranks third.

Germany, which twelve years ago Thursday came to the support of Austria and opened the world struggle, now ranks next to last in armaments and is the only one of the central European powers to be mentioned in the estimates given out. Germany is out-ranked by Italy and Japan in spending only slightly more than Russia.

The Italy of Premier Mussolini, much discussed in the press of today because of her allegedly imperialistic designs, is spending on an average \$156,000,000 a year for armaments, or \$3.86 per capita; Japan is ordering armaments and paying her military men \$219,000,000, which represents \$3.68 per capita in the over-populated Japanese empire. Russia trails along in sixth place with expenditures of \$191,000,000 annually or \$1.45 per capita, while Germany's expenditures each year are set at \$108,000,000 or \$1.70 per capita.
