Both these men are fast and have excellent reputations to uphold, so all indications are that local patrons of the squared circle will leave Scandia hall the third Tuesday in August, talking excitedly about a real fight treat.

Both the runner-up clubs, Oakland and Sacramento lost their games. Hollywood defeated the Oaks 4 to 3, while Mission trimmed the Senators for the third consecutive time, 4 to 3.

Walter Mills pitched in splendid form for the youthful and aspiring Seals and got more breaks than his opponent Elliott, who allowed only two hits.

Both these safeties came in the first inning and mixed with a pass, gave San Francisco two runs. The final score was 2 to 0, it being Seattle's second straight defeat.

Swimming Record Is Established At Quaker Beach

SESQUICENTENNIAL BATHING BEACH, Philadelphia, July 29.—(United News)—One new world's record and a new American record were established here on the second day of the A. A. U. national swimming championships.

Arne Borg of the Illinois A. C. broke his own world's mark for the 880-yard free style swim by 5 2/5 seconds, covering the distance in 10:38 2/5 to defeat his team mate, Johnnie Weismuller. Borg made his former record in Honolulu in 1924.

A. Paul Wyatt of the Uniontown, Pa., Y. M. C. A., made a new American record of 2:45 2/5 in the 220-yard backstroke.

Lady Governor of Wyoming Honored At Conferences

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Saratoga Racing Meet Opening Is Eagerly Awaited

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., July 29.—(United News)—Who's who on the turf is gathered here for the opening of the Saratoga meeting, the peak of the 1926 racing season, which will see the distribution of nearly \$500,000 in purses, and the possible settling of the three-year-old championship.

More than 1200 horses will be here during the 26 days of racing at the famous spa.

The bugle trumpeting the opening of the first event will be blown Friday.

The gambling situation apparently has not changed. A few days ago an edict to suppress gambling at the famous race resort was issued, but bookies are in evidence at all the hotels and around the track grounds.

The outstanding thoroughbreds of the year—Crusader, Offspring of the mighty man-o'-war, Bubbling Over, winner of the Kentucky Derby; Chance Play, Haggenbaggare, Pompey, Haate and Carlisle—are in the Saratoga stables already or will be shipped.

The long awaited battle between Bubbling Over and Crusader is in prospect as both are eligible for the Huron handicap at a mile and three-sixteenths late in August.

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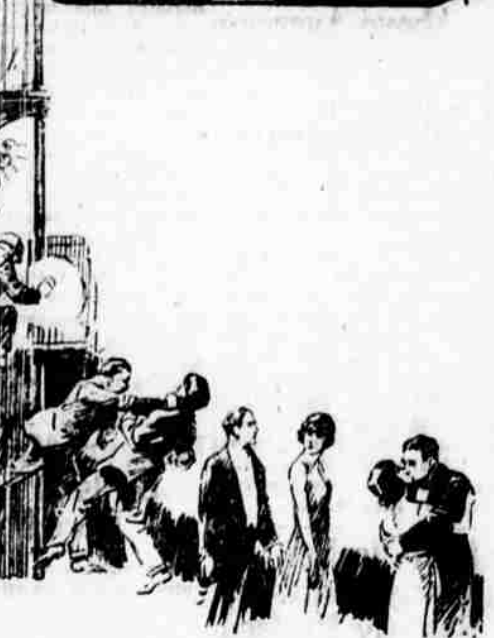
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
