CLEVER PERFORMANCE

Considering the number of cars on the highways and traveling the forest trails, the small list of accidents is a compliment to care in operation, and quality in manufacture. It is really surprising how much rough treatment the average automobile will stand, and how persistently it "gets there" in spite of everything. When casualties occur it is usually some mistake of the driver more than any weakness in the machine.

Since Klamath is so dependent on automobiles we continue to preach carefulness. The men who handle the various makes are as anxious as we to encourage the safety-first idea, and if anyone must get careless, here's hoping it will not be towards night, when drivers are apt to be tired.

WHY GO AWAY?

Any discussion of fishing around here usually includes a recommendation of Diamond Lake. From all reports there is good sport up that way, but Klamath county is by no means behind the procession with well-stocked lakes and streams. The News believes we ought to boost our own, and if necessary make special provision to maintain our own.

Klamath can easily quadruple the number of well-to-do visitors by promoting its hunting and fishing advantages. Occasionally we run across someone who would rather not divide the sport with outsiders, but anyone coming here for a vacation is just as apt as not to make investments here. If the average man likes a place, he usually wants to connect with it in a business way. And those who have the time and money to go touring and fishing ought to be worth our while to encourage.

ASHLAND'S OPPORTUNITY

Judging from the Ashland Tidings some people there are worrying over the possible bad effects of Klamath's new railroad. All of which is borrowing unnecessary trouble. The natural growth of Coast business will provide traffic enough for both lines, and

two years from now we will be wondering what the fuss was all about. Ashland has advantages and resources at present barely touched, and if its citizens care to get busy they can quickly stimulate activity in fruit-growing and kindred lines. The biggest need in America today is more self-supporting homes, and of all towns on the map Ashland is perfectly equipped to supply them. Coupled with the steadily rising tide of tourist travel, that city ought to be "sitting pretty," and anything like fear and trembling is in no sense justified by the facts.

BACK TO OREGON

(Oregon Journal)
Portland rate on first class freight to and from Klamath Falls \$1.34 per 100 pounds.

San Francisco rate on first class freight to and from Klamath Falls \$1.57 1/2 per 100 pounds.

These will be the rates over the new Naton cut-off and after September 1. The rate sheets have already been distributed by J. H. Mulchay, assistant traffic manager of the Southern Pacific.

It is change. It is progress. It is the effect of railroad building. Formerly, San Francisco by rail was 100 miles nearer Klamath Falls, because, to reach Klamath Falls from Portland, a roundabout trip down into California had to be made. Now, Portland is 88 miles nearer, because, via the Naton cut-off, the route is direct.

Under the old arrangement Klamath Falls, commercially, was California territory. Most of its business was done with California. Its main bank connections were with California. Even socially its relations were mostly with California.

For a long time, Klamath Falls got its first news from the outside world through California newspapers. In nearly all things its touch was chiefly with California and Californians. That city of destiny was Oregon territory only by state limits and at voting time.

The same is now true of Lakeview and will continue to be true until an adjustment is reached between the rail lines on the Central Oregon railroad map. In what we now see as to Klamath Falls we can also see as to what ought to be as to Lakeview and the big territory that it represents.

In these modern days communication is a master factor. People go where they can go and where it is easiest to go. They do business where they can do business and where it is easiest to do business and cheapest to do business.

It is to the lasting credit of the Southern Pacific that it has finally built the Naton cut-off. The delay of the past is all forgotten in the fact that the line now is.

of Keyes' staff and representatives of the bar association sifted Ryan's evidence. They are believed to have reached the conclusion that it warranted perjury charges being brought against certain persons who testified at previous hearings.

Grand Jury Smarts

Shortly after Keyes' announcement, Foreman William Carter of the grand jury put the case squarely up to the district attorney in a stinging statement.

Almost immediately Keyes issued a subpoena for the appearance of the evangelist before the county grand jury next Tuesday. The subpoena was placed in the hands of detectives late this afternoon. They were expected to serve it on Mrs. McPherson before nightfall.

"There must be no more beating around the bush about this case," Carter said. "We do not wish to handle it unless the district attorney has sufficient evidence to indict and convict."

"We have been perfectly willing all along to get to the bottom of this if a legitimate charge substantiated by the evidence was forthcoming."

Report Left Case Open

"The wording of our report on the previous probe of the case was such as to make it possible that in the event any additional evidence was disclosed the case would properly be re-opened."

Keyes indicated he would present the case before the jurors Tuesday, their next session.

All the Monterey witnesses, said to have identified Mrs. McPherson as the woman who occupied a bungalow in the isolated artist colony for several days following her disappearance at Venice, May 18, will be summoned to appear here, he said.

must be based on the "inviolability of the church's constitution."

They said that they objected to the law requiring priests to register, taking the position that priests should not be ruled by laws of the country which they do not consider superior to the laws of the church. It was said that they would not object to registration under the police.

Seldom in days of peace has Mexico City witnessed a sight such as is seen at any hour of the day in the plaza between the national palace and the Catholic cathedral.

Churchmen say that 60,000 persons, many of them carrying infants for baptism, trudged across the plaza Thursday and filed through the Catholic house of worship, where Archbishop Mora del Rio, head of the Catholic church in Mexico, six bishops and ten black robed acolytes performed their duties.

Gendarmes passed through the crowded cathedral and assisted in keeping the throngs moving. They were careful not to antagonize the saddened throngs and showed the utmost courtesy to women and children. As they passed through the cathedral they might have heard groups of devout pilgrims calling out in protest against the acts of the Calles government.

"Religious liberty is dead, but Christ still reigns."

Men and women massed deep around the balustrade where the ceremony of baptism was performed frequently placed their infants on the railing or held them high in order to make sure that the babies' heads would be crossed by the holy oil. As each tiny head was touched one of the acolytes wiped off the oil with a swab of cotton.

Hawkers moved in and out of the cathedral peddling their wares and frequently a beggar appeared asking alms. Outside could be heard the sound of workmen's hammers being used in building an additional story on the national palace.

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 768 of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city, at his office in the City Hall, up to and including Monday, the 31st day of August, 1926, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. for making the proposed improvement of Oak street from the easterly line of Ninth street to Spring street, Eleventh street from the southerly line of Walnut street to a connection with the proposed improvement of Oak street. Market street from Spring street to the existing pavement on Market street being the southerly line of Lot 10, Block 7, and the southerly line of Lot 30, Block 18 of Second Railroad addition to Klamath Falls, Oregon. Klamath avenue from the west line of Market street to the easterly line of Eleventh street, and Broad street from the south line of Main street to the north line of Oak avenue.

The proposed improvement to be made includes grading, rolling, drainage and curbing; all of the said pavement is to be full width except Market street, on which the cement sidewalks are to be omitted, although grading is to be full width. All roadways are to be forty (40) feet wide, back to back of curbs, except Eleventh street, where the roadway is to be 35 feet in width; all in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates, and with the plans and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge.

Said improvement shall be made of Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, or asphaltic concrete with asphaltic concrete base, or Warrentite Bitulithic with crushed rock base, or asphaltic concrete with crushed rock base, all of said proposed improvements to be made together with the materials to be used in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city.

Also bids will be received for the maintenance of said improvement for the succeeding five years from the date of acceptance of the work on a basis per square yard per year. Said improvement will be let in one contract and bids will be received for each kind of pavement specified above, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the ninth day of August, 1926, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the City Engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Bids for bids may be obtained at the office of the Police Judge.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check for five per cent of the amount bid, as guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city for the making of such improvement within 10 days from the date of making such award.

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 768 of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said city, at his office in the City Hall, up to and including Monday, the ninth day of August, 1926, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P. M. for making the proposed improvement of Alameda street from the northerly line of Melrose street to the easterly boundary line of the city; Pacific Terrace from the southerly line of Huron street to its intersection with Alameda avenue or street; Melrose street from the westerly line of Eldorado avenue to its intersection with Alameda street; Erie street from the westerly line of Pacific Terrace to its intersection with Alameda street.

The proposed improvement to be made includes grading, rolling, drainage and curbing, and gutters, and five-foot cement sidewalks. Pacific Terrace and Melrose—35-foot roadways, separated with a 40-foot central parking strip, except at intersections. Alameda is to be improved only on the easterly side, 40 feet in width, and is to have a 21-foot roadway, with parking and cement sidewalks on the easterly side thereof only. Sanitary sewer systems are to be placed on Pacific Terrace and Alameda, where not already installed; also on Melrose and Erie streets. Catch basins and necessary storm sewers are to be placed where needed, with suitable discharges in the U. S. Government Canal; all in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge.

Said improvement shall be made of Portland cement concrete or Vibrolithic or Warrentite Bitulithic pavement with bituminous concrete base, or asphaltic concrete with asphaltic concrete base, or Warrentite Bitulithic with crushed rock base, or asphaltic concrete with crushed rock base, all of said proposed improvements to be made together

with the materials to be used in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference to which is hereby made regarding further details for plans, construction, materials, quantities, and the like.
