

Yankees, Indians Continue Streak Winning Games

The Yankees and the Cleveland Indians maintained their winning pace today as the Huguen, aided by Babe Ruth's thirty-second homer won an eleven-inning see-saw battle from the Browns 19 to 8, while the Indians scored a 4 to 1 win over the Athletics.

The Yankees still are nine games in front.

A ninth inning rally which netted two runs was responsible for the White Sox victory over the Senators, 5 to 2. Goose Goslin's home run failed to bring victory to the Senators. The Red Sox trimmed the Tigers 4 to 3, although Whitehill allowed only nine hits.

The Cardinals beat the Giants 5 to 2, touching Fitzsimmons and Scott for 12 hits. Flowers and Bell of the Cards hit homers. With Grimes pitching almost flawless ball, the Robins won from the Cubs 4 to 1. The champion Pirates, on the other hand, were beaten by the lowly Phillies 6 to 1, Kremer being knocked out of the box in the seventh inning. The Reds-Braves game was called on account of rain.

Princess Doreen Soundly Trounces All Field Racers

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., July 30.—(United News)—New York's racing metropolis, the Saratoga track, where horses have pounded their way to fame for more than sixty years, opened its 24-day meeting today amid the glorious fanfare of the turf.

Racing followers from every corner of the United States were on hand to see the Audley Farm's grand old mare, Princess Doreen soundly trounce a classy field, including Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt's temperamental Sarazen in the opening day feature, the Saratoga handicap. The victory brought Princess Doreen's owner \$8,650. Sarazen, the favorite, carried an impost of 129 pounds, but even with it he should have streaked home a winner. The son of High Time-Rush Box showed a world of speed in a workout Thursday but he was in a sulky mood today and four horses finished ahead of him in the mile and a quarter feature.

Harry Payne Whitney's Blondin placed second, and King Solomon's Seal was third.

Another attraction of the opening day besides the Saratoga handicap, was the \$5000 Flash handicap, first of the stakes for two-year-olds, won by J. E. Widener's Osmond with Earl Sands up. The premier jockey handled his mount faultlessly. Osmond was always close to the pace and wore down Candy Queen under hard pressure in the stretch. The race was at five and a half furlongs.

W. R. Coe's Pompey, champion juvenile of last year, was scratched in the inaugural, a sprint at six furlongs. Croyden, owned by Harry Payne Whitney, broke quickly and was taken in the best going throughout to win. Loved One finished, while Needle Gun ran third.

In the two-mile steeplechase, with 17 jumps, Silver Hackle had all the speed of the field disposed of opposition in the first mile to win with something to spare. Gravity II was second and Ruine was third. The victory brought \$900 for R. W. Bird, Silver Hackle's owner.
