REV. AND MRS. RICE LEAVE ON VACATION TRIP

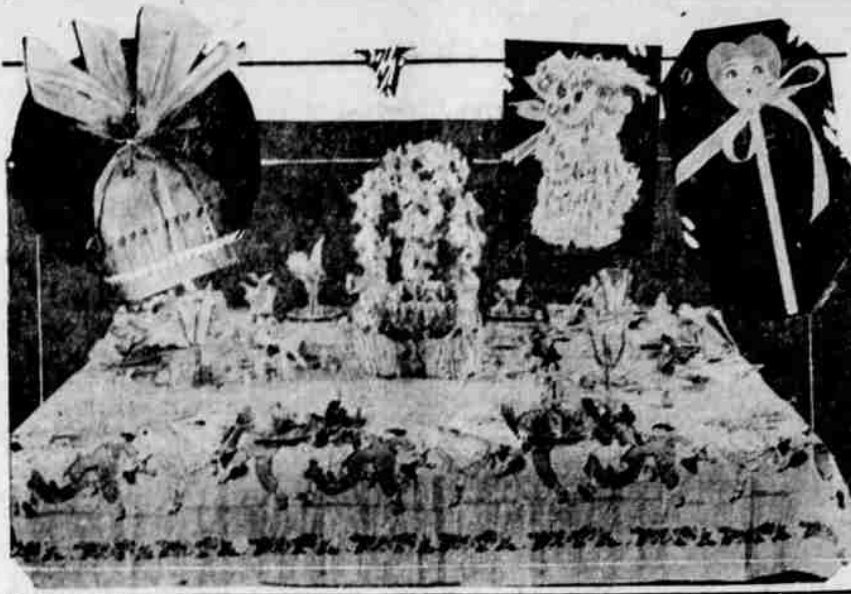
Beginning their month's vacation,

Klamath Falls. A copy of which Mrs.
J. C. Johnston of Canby street,
has kindly given to friends and
following is the story which ap-
peared under the pictures of the
four girls in their traveling tops.

"Touring the entire stretch of the
nation's border and some inland
sections as well—a mere matter of
a jaunt of, roughly, 9000 miles—
is coming in this age of travel to be
a trip of little difficulty, hazard
or, indeed, too tremendous
excitement.

At least that is the modest ad-
mission of four bobbed-headed
school teachers from Klamath Falls,
Oregon, who arrived here yesterday
in a dusty condition by roaring fly-
ver and passed in their border
flight to give the capital a thor-
ough inspection.

Find Trip Enjoyable
But what the vast expanse of the
United States lacks today in the
way of former thrills in the form of
Indians, deserts, wild west lands,
impassable roads and what not it
makes up in enjoyable touring, out-
door life and carefree sport. That
is the verdict of these Oregon
"schoolmarm"—and they should
know after more than 5000 miles
of experience.

Answering the call of the out
of doors at the close of school in
June, Misses Rena Goers, Anna Mae
Johnston, Hazel Noble and Freda
Kjaek loaded a flyver with camp-
ing equipment, tent, blankets,
searchlights, 30-30 rifle and all,
and donning knickers and other
outing accouterments, started June
11 to explore the border.

Driving an average of 175 miles
a day, the four round-the-nation
tourists passed through Washing-
ton State, California, Texas, then
along the Gulf States to Florida,
where they made an extended trip
to Orlando. Then up the coast to
Washington they came, reporting
they had but seven punctures and
three blowouts during the trip of
more than 5000 miles.

Claim Record of Tires

And when it comes to changing
tires this quartet claims something
of a record in a complete change
in six minutes.

"We had but one scare on the
eastward trip," recounted Miss
Goers, "and we discovered the sup-
posed prowler or highwayman to

be one of our own party who got
up to tie a flapping corner of our
tent."

The group, all of whom are in
their teens or early twenties, will go
from here to Philadelphia, New
York, Niagara Falls and then on
west to Klamath Falls, arriving at
the opening of school in September.

They were to be received by Sen-
ator McNary of their home state
this afternoon.
