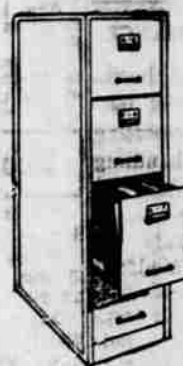
By July 31 the post office had collected \$32,487.56, as against
