

Women Indignant Over Order Issued By Union Pacific

DENVER, Aug. 5.—(United News)—It is difficult for me to believe that such an organization as the Union Pacific railway would refuse employment to women, as announced today by Mr. W. A. Jeffers, general manager of the road, said Mrs. Helen B. Bell, prominent professional woman.

I am sure there is something else back of such an order. Large corporations such as the Union Pacific have been making rapid strides in recent years to push women forward, rather than to hold them back in the commercial world. I cannot believe women are incapable of holding the important positions in commercial life, where they are not physically handicapped. I believe that already women have demonstrated their fitness to occupy places in the world of business.

Nine out of ten men in the largest corporations are willing and anxious to give women advancement as they merit. The action of the Union Pacific seems to me to be a step backward.

Men who would issue such an order as Mr. Jeffers is reported to have issued must be of very limited vision, and I repeat, I can hardly believe such an order will stand.

The action of Union Pacific officials will not influence other large corporations to prevent women from taking their place in the commercial life. It will not prove a serious setback in the progress of women. Instead I am inclined to believe it will have the opposite effect. The Union Pacific has made a mistake. The order cannot stand.

Strange Cult Is Cause of Hurried Exit From Denver

DENVER, August 5.—(United News)—While scores of members of the strange cult for men and boys now being investigated by the district attorney's office, were believed to be slipping quietly out of the city, three of the "high priests" of the order were admitted to jail today and a fourth, described as "the most sinister of the group," was remanded to jail.

Those freed on bail today were Richard W. Bechtel, studio photographer; Dr. Ralph H. Koonitz, dentist; and Leslie Mercer, clerk. W. W. Wilson, clerk at a fashionable hotel, is still held. Bonds of \$2500 were furnished by each of the three men after information was filed charging juvenile delinquency.

Judge Ben E. Lindsey, one of America's most famous juvenile jurists, continued silent on the case today for the reason that he may sit in judgment on the accused.

Historic Mining Camp Wiped Out By Conflagration

MODESTO, Cal., August 5.—(United News)—The historic old mining town of Priest in Tuolumne county, was wiped out today by a brush fire that swept through the little community, razing all its buildings and leaving 50 persons homeless.

The blaze for a time threatened Big Oak Flat, a town of 200 inhabitants, but a change in the wind sent the flames in another direction.

Power lines of the San Francisco Hetch-Hetchy project were in the path of the fire and many of them were burned down, cutting off all communication with the Early intake plant. The fire burned to within half a mile of the Big Moccasin power plant, but the structure was not in danger.

Roy F. Neil, member of an old Fort Klamath family, is here for the remainder of the week on a combined business and pleasure visit.

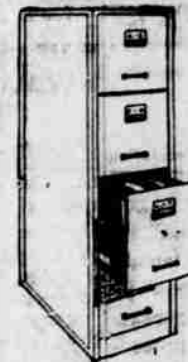

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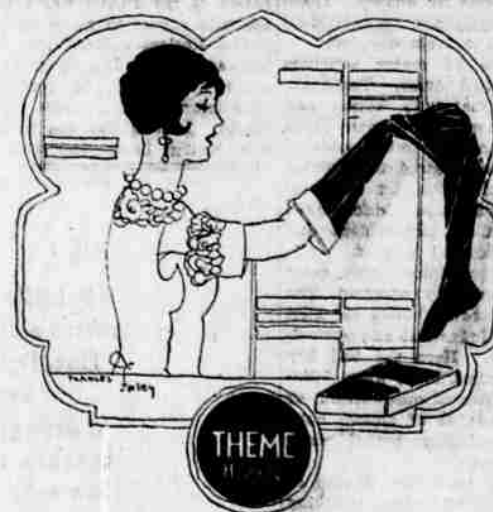
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
