17. Klamath officers arrested 33.

Lane 41. Klamath obtained 31 convictions in justice courts against 28 for Lane. Multnomah county, where Portland is located, reported 13 arrests and none convicted.

Klamath county was second in fines assessed which totaled during the month of June alone, \$3,937.50.

Klamath was second only to Lane, whose fines totaled \$4,595. Klamath led the 36 counties, however, in the number of fines paid. According to the June report \$2,942.50 rolled into the coffers.

Clackamas county led in evidence of liquor destroyed. Although only three arrests were made and \$559 paid in fines, 206 gallons were brought into the court house. Klamath reported 40 gallons. Multnomah county, 57, Jackson none and Josephine county, one.

An interesting feature of the June report shows only 30 days served as jail sentences in Klamath county. Coos county, on the coast, reported 2520 days, seconded by Lane county with 285 days.

According to Forncrook the July report should be more interesting than the one just received, as the early part of the past month was exceptionally busy for prohibition men.

community problems no other organization meets.

"Third—The provision to meet community problems no other organization meets.

"Fourth—Its great source to mankind in caring for those misfortunes which may befall any of us today.

"Fifth—It is a form of insurance that has the confidence of those it serves; only a part of its functions may be of value to a given community at this or any other time, but the protection of its existence cannot be denied. There is no community and no individual that is immune from disaster.

"There are 16 major activities of the Salvation Army. There are rescue and maternity homes and hospitals where unfortunate girls who have become wifeless mothers may be properly cared for. There are industrial homes for men, infirm and otherwise unfortunate, who are out of employment and whom no one will employ.

"There are children that must be found homes by adoption. The Army has boarding homes for girls and juvenile industrial and agricultural schools. Here the bad boy or girl of a community, when delinquency is a case of misdirection, or an over-abundance of animal spirits is uncontrolled, is brought back to self esteem.

"The Army devotes much time to slum settlements where working men's hotels are established. Free employment bureaus are maintained. Prison work is fruitful of results; fresh air camps are established and maintained; Christmas dinners are given to the needy; there is an anti-suicide bureau; there are training schools and work is carried on among ex-service men. The under-privileged child is one of the great features that is now being carved out."

CHICAGO, August 5.—(United News)—After disclosing expenditures of nearly a million dollars in the Illinois primary, the senate "slush" committee has adjourned until November, when it will cite three witnesses to the United States senate for contempt because they refused to answer Senator James Reed's questions.

Father and Son Fight Duel and Former Killed

BISMARCK, Mo., Aug. 5.—(United News)—Weary of seeing his mother continually abused, 22-year-old Edgar Campbell, challenged his father, Captain Ewing W. Campbell, 56, a wealthy land owner, to a duel late today and killed him after both had fired two shots.

The father used a revolver, while the son fought with a shotgun. Other details of the tragedy are lacking, except that young Campbell then surrendered himself to the authorities.

He accused his father of habitually abusing his wife and of violently beating her today.

Following an open verdict of the coroner's jury, Campbell was held under bond to await a preliminary hearing next week.

orders in the interior, although it has been authoritatively known that these disorders occurred.

Second, denial by local bankers that there have been withdrawals from the banks, although it is known that these withdrawals have been made.

El Imparcial, a Mexico City newspaper, has published a Torreón dispatch declaring that one person was killed and eight were wounded in a religious riot there Sunday. This is the first publication here of a report of a serious clash.

Other Mexico City newspapers have been notably silent as to clashes.

Mayor is Attacked

The Imparcial's dispatch says that 300 persons, most of them excited Catholics, marched to the central plaza in Torreón, crying "long live religion." One woman was placed in jail when she attacked the mayor for his refusal to issue a permit for a parade. The crowd increased and a thousand marched to the center of the city where they met, knocked down police and threatened them with a bomb.

When they had driven off the gendarmes 50 federal members and 50 infantrymen were called out. Two hundred shots were fired over the heads of those in the crowd, but the demonstrators refused to be dispersed.

The cavalrymen then charged, killing one man who attempted to seize a soldier's rifle, and wounding eight others, including several women who had led the agitation, according to the dispatches.

Many arrests were made and among those placed in jail were several socially prominent. The dispatch says that troops are still patrolling the streets of Torreón.

FOREST IS REPORTED ABLAZE ON MOUNTAIN

feet of valuable pine timber and totally destroyed a lumber mill in the vicinity. Is smoldering in a great many places, according to a local business man who visited the Lakeview district the first of the week.

"The smoke, of course, is coming from small burns within the burned over area," he stated, declaring that these are fully under control and are doing no new property.

In spite of the absence of fire within this county during the past two weeks, conditions generally are unrelieved throughout the Pacific northwest, according to reports from Portland, which state that hot, dry weather and low humidity continues, with the forest fire hazard acute.

The state forester reports that while many fires are blazing throughout Oregon, most of them are under control. This is true of the bad fire which has been destroying valuable stands of yellow pine in the Bend district.

Eugene reports a large fire burning in the Simslaw national forest south of Alsea, as well as eight smaller fires in the Cascade national forest. The first serious fire in the mid-Columbia district is burning fiercely.

10,000 chickens have been produced on the place. "Our farm is situated in the midst of our 160 acres of virgin timber," Kesler said, stating that the bulk of the feed used is purchased at Keno and other points. None of it is raised on the farm.

Virtually all of the eggs produced on the Log Cabin farm are shipped to outside points for hatching purposes. These go all through the northwest and California, Kesler said, and with increased production next year, he and his wife expect to open markets in the midwest and east for their high grade eggs. Only thoroughbred chickens are raised on the farm.

Only a small part of the poultry produce consumed in Klamath Falls and the county generally, is raised in the county, Kesler stated, and with this city continuing to grow the next few years at the present rate, the market will be even better. "Truly," he declared, "poultry possibilities in the county are unlimited and thoroughbred stock is the way to success."

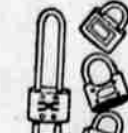
