

Oregon Complaint Filed With I. C. C. At Washington

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(United News)—The Oregon public service commission's motion that the executives of the Southern Pacific and the northern lines be cited to explain why they have not tried a little harder to agree on trackage arrangements for entry of the north lines into Klamath Falls has been entered on the records of the interstate commerce commission, but whether any immediate action will be taken is uncertain.

This obscenity is due to the fact that the commission has no spokesman and no direct rules governing such a matter. At the present time several members of the commission are out of town, including Commissioner Aitchison, who penned the opinion in the case from which the application springs. Just before he left for an extended western trip it was said that no developments on the Oregon situation were in sight. One division of the commission is on duty here through the summer vacation to look after rate suspension and other emergency matters, and it would be entirely possible to take up the question of citing the railroad officials at any time. However, the probabilities are considered against it.

The case was heard by the entire commission and opinions heard in commission circles is that the matter will be referred to the full commission when it reassembles about the first of October.

It is taken for granted that Commissioner Aitchison will be present and the railroad men will be given notice of the proceeding with appropriate time for reply.

OPENS STEAM THROTTLE AND RELEASES JUICE

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—Mayor Baker pulled open a steam throttle at Station 1, the steam electric plant of the Portland Electric Power company, at 2 o'clock Thursday.

In a flash 25,000 additional horsepower of generating capacity was put to work and Station 1, at the foot of East Lincoln street, became the greatest electric power plant of its kind in the northwest, its rated output being raised to 56,000 horsepower.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(United News)—Harry Sullivan, considered one of the most dangerous criminals on the Pacific coast, was brought back to the United States from London today for trial for an

alleged holdup of a San Francisco mail truck, more than a year ago. Sullivan, who was captured in London, where he fled following the alleged crime, is reported to have subdued two guards single handed and looted mail sacks of securities and registered letters amounting to \$300,000.

Heat Wave Hits Chicago; People Are Half Dazed

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(United News)—Caught between two heat waves, one out of the east and the other from the west, Chicago stripped down to shirtsleeves, watched the thermometer glide above the 90 mark and heard dismal forecasts of continued heat, which may send mercury to peak marks for the season.

An abnormal amount of moisture in the atmosphere and a lack of breeze have added to the oppressiveness of the high temperatures. Thousands are sleeping in the parks and the several hundred public beaches which fringe Lake Michigan are being kept open all night to accommodate the hordes of relief seekers.

Beaches today swarmed with the heaviest crowds of the summer and the wading pools in the various parks were taxed to capacity by thousands of youngsters.

Four more deaths were reported late today, bringing the heat toll to 13 within the past 24 hours. More than a score of prostrations have been reported.

Mining Man Buried For Seven Hours; Digs His Way Out

REDDING, Cal., Aug. 5.—A. A. Anthony, mining engineer, was buried for seven hours in an abandoned mine tunnel north of here today. He was inspecting the shaft when a cave-in blocked the passage. Anthony was unconscious for several hours but finally managed to dig his way out. A few moments after he had escaped a new slide of rock and earth blocked the passage again.
