

Gertrude Ederle Is First Woman To Swim Channel

Accomplishes Feat All Members of Sex Have Failed and at Same Time Breaks Record Made by Tiraboschi

KINGSDOWN, England, Aug. 6.—(United News)—Gertrude Ederle has conquered the English channel.

The first woman ever to swim across the turbulent stretch of water separating England from France, swam Friday from Cape Gris Nez to Kingsdown in 14 1/2 hours.

The young American girl not only accomplished a feat which swimmers of her sex had always attempted in vain, but she broke by nearly two hours the best previous record made three years ago by Sebastien Tiraboschi, an Italian-American.

U. N. Tag Accompanies Her

As she neared the line of breakers off Kingsdown on the English shore, the United News tug La Morinie, which had accompanied her, threw its searchlight on the beach. By its light Gertrude could be seen getting to her feet. She straightened up proudly and walked unassisted for 200 yards up the beach as required by channel swimming rules. She went into the water off Gris Nez at 7:09 a. m. and waded out at Kingsdown at 3:14 tonight.

As Miss Ederle was nearing the end of her swim the La Morinie, standing off the cliffs of Deal in the gathering darkness, sounded its whistle triumphantly and sent up blue flares.

Red flares were burning just beyond the white breakers on the beach to guide the swimmer.

With night falling rapidly over the choppy waters of the channel, those aboard the tug peered through the gloom, keeping anxious watch for the bobbing head and flashing white arm of the plucky girl gave all she had in her effort to reach the shore.

The American girl's stamina, considering the speed with which she had traversed the treacherous channel and the icy currents on her long swim amazed those who witnessed the successful finish.

Father Was Happy

Hardest of all was Henry Ederle, her father, who was aboard the tug Alamo during the swim, and who had danced a jig of triumph when he saw his daughter was about to be successful.

This was Miss Ederle's second attempt to swim the waters, which for three years had defied the best efforts of both men and women. Although she failed last summer she was brave and lighthearted through the long hours Friday.

At no time, apparently, did Gertrude lose heart, though the swift tides tugged her from her course and carried her many more miles than a row of files between Gris Nez and the English cliffs.

Tide Changed Plan

Miss Ederle had planned to finish her swim near Dover, which is the nearest point from the French shore, when she started, but a tide started bearing her eastward, shortly after nine o'clock Friday night.

When finally she threw all her strength into the effort and spurred through the surf to the shore, she first touched land at the point occupied by the Kingsdown lifeboat station.

During the last two miles the waters had been mercifully calm. So was Miss Ederle, calm and supremely confident.

On the beach at Kingsdown, a crowd had gathered, composed of soldiers from a near-by encampment and men, women and children from Deal and other towns for miles around.

HELEN IS DEFEATED BY ELIZABETH RYAN

SEABRIGHT, N. J., Aug. 6.—(United News)—Helen Wilks, national women's singles champion, rated the best amateur woman tennis player in the world, since Suzanne Langlen's entry into the professional ranks, went down to unexpected, but decisive defeat in the finals of the Seabright invitation tournament Friday.

Miss Elizabeth Ryan of California, the strapping veteran player who has perfected her game on English courts in recent years, defeated Miss Wilks in straight sets, 6-4, 6-1.

Surprising as the result was to several thousand spectators who gathered about the center court at Seabright, it would seem to indicate that Miss Ryan has an edge upon her youthful opponent, for they have met in competition in tournaments but twice, and each time the older woman has won. It was in the finals of the Seabright tournament last year that Miss Ryan scored over Miss Wilks.

This year the result never was in doubt, as the champion was behind at the start and never took the lead for as much as a single game.

Nebraska Wildcat Is Held to Draw By Chile Fighter

CONEY ISLAND STADIUM, New York, August 6.—(United News)—Ace Hudkins nearly trumped another trick on the road to the lightweight championship, honors Friday night, but the dark-skinned Chilean Stanielus Loaysa of Chile proved the joker in the deck and held the Nebraska wildcat to a draw in the 12 rounds of furious fighting at Coney Island stadium.

The westerner was the harder hitter and in the closing rounds he battered Loaysa into a dusky red pulp, but the Chilean was stung his man often enough to sway the judges in their decision.

Hudkins might have become a champion in the old days, when men were punching bags, but he lacks the finesse and boxing skill of a modern champion.

Only the fact that there was little power behind the lefts which Loaysa kept hooking into Ace's face enabled the wildcat to survive the early rounds. The Chilean went out into the lead on points, but only once or twice during the fight did he even fluster the westerner with his showers of punches.

Hudkins, on the other hand, fought roughly and at times committed palpable fouls for which he was warned by Patry Haley, the referee.
