CELERY SOUP Cook hearts and upper parts of stalks of celery—that are left after best stalks have been used—until tender, press through colander, and add one heaping tablespoon of rice previously boiled. You will find it a great help to keep a quantity of rice cooked ready for soups, etc. Return rice and celery to fire with water in which the celery was cooked or at least one pint of it with one pint of milk and a small piece of butter, season with salt and serve.

APPLE PUDDING Use one apple to each person and stew in water as for sauce. When apples are almost done, drop in spoons of batter made as follows: Five tablespoons flour, one teaspoon baking powder, pinch of salt, one-half cup of water. Beat well and cook with apples. Serve with sugar and milk or cream. Cherries or peaches can also be used this way for a quick dessert.

France Probably Not to Approve Debt Settlement

PARIS, Aug. 6.—(United News)—Developments Friday are believed to have made certain as predicted by the United News that the American war debt settlement will not be ratified before adjournment of parliament.

A strong movement in parliament and in other quarters has made itself felt in opposition to ratification of the Mellon-Boraher agreement.

Premier Poincare has issued a communique, which, while most carefully phrased, has left little doubt that debts, for the moment at least, are barred.

"Certain newspaper agencies," said the communique, "have indicated the government's intention to ask the chamber in the interest of financial restoration to vote before the parliamentary vacation on the Washington debt accord."

The communique then points out that Poincare asked appointment of a committee to investigate the debt payments (only that the committee could study the question and submit a report to the finance commission).

It added that Poincare would be ready to appear before the commission when summoned.
