Black Sea Fleet Reported to Have Entered Revolt

BUCHAREST, Aug. 7.—(United Press)—Unconfirmed reports from Moscow reported that the Russian Black Sea fleet had rebelled and mobilization of the soviet army had been ordered.

The fleet, according to report, was bombarding a portion of the Russian coast after occupying the cities of Ketch and Kerson.

Reports of civil disorders in southern Russia have been coming out of Bucharest for 24 hours. So far there has been no confirmation of the stories and the soviet Russian representatives in Berlin yesterday denied the report that there had been any uprising in the Ukraine.

where the government forces number upward of 2500 and private timber protective associations have even a larger payroll principally in the Idaho panhandle.

The woods are like tinder and fire spreads more rapidly, due to the humidity conditions, than in any previous year. Damage in July alone was four times greater than in the combined past two years with Howard Flint, federal district fire inspector, characterizing the general situation as being so bad it couldn't be any worse.
