

Old Tennis Stars Save Day; Young People Must Wait

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., August 9. (United News) The old guard of American tennis neither dies nor surrenders. Youth must wait another year to be served.

"Big Bill" Tilden and "Little Bill" Johnston and Dick Williams, veterans of many a Davis cup fight, succeeded Monday in staying off the challenge of three youngsters who would have disputed the right of the "big three" to places on the team which this year will defend the trophy.

Only Vincent Richards was missing when the flashing racquets of the veterans beat off the attack of Alfred Chapin, Jr., Lott, and Ed. Chandler.

"Vinnie" whom one must class as a veteran now, was to have played Lewis White in the Davis cup trials, but injured his leg Sunday and was excused by the selection committee. The young New York star is certain of a place on the team.

Tilden and Johnston and Williams did not triumph by comfortable margins. However, each had trouble in disposing of his opponent.

Ed Chandler carried "Big Bill" to three sets in the first trial match, the scores being 6-2, 1-6, 6-2.

Dick Williams had to summon all his tennis fitness to beat George Lott, 3-6, 6-1, 7-5.

Johnston was given a great battle by Chapin before he triumphed over the Springfield youngster 6-4, 7-5.

The margins were small but convincing. This year's Davis cup defenders will include no new faces. The trials will continue for several days.

Elizabeth Ryan May Become A Professional

EW YORK, August 9. (United News) After the women's national tennis championships at Forest Hills next week Miss Elizabeth Ryan may announce her acceptance of an offer to turn professional and provide Suzanne Lenglen with competition when that temperamental young woman tours the United States in the fall. For the present the California star is maintaining a discreet silence concerning a report that C. C. Pyle has offered her \$100,000 to become Suzanne's professional opponent.

Naturally, Miss Ryan's success in the national singles championship will affect her market value. Naturally, too, she does not want to turn pro before she has a try for Helen Wills' crown. It is significant that Miss Ryan and Miss Lenglen are close friends and former doubles partners. Also the tall Californian is the only woman player aside from Suzanne who has a clean slate of consecutive victories over Helen Wills. Miss Ryan and Miss Wills have met twice in tournament competition and the former has won both times.

With Helen obviously off her game this may prove Miss Ryan's year at Forest Hills. If so she might be worth money as Suzanne's partner.

As national champion Miss Ryan might prove a worthy member of Pyle's traveling tennis troupe, but as he has already promised Suzanne \$100,000 he can have no such sum in mind for the American player. One handicap is that Miss Ryan has no public following.

New York Likes Million Dollar Idea of Fight

NEW YORK, Aug. 9. (United News) Values have changed some since George Washington threw that silver dollar across the Potomac, but it is still safe to wager that the New York boxing commission will not throw a million dollars across the Hudson.

One million dollars in round numbers, will be the profits to New York city and state if Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney fight for the heavyweight championship at Yankee stadium Sept. 16.

At 10:30 a. m. Tuesday the license committee and the boxing board must say whether New York wants that million or whether Rickard must take his dolls and go over and play in Jersey City. Even Chairman James A. Farley's solicitude on behalf of a certain Ethiopian should not weigh very heavily in the balance against the thought of the ferry loads of cash customers streaming into another state to spend their money.

One thing that has been somewhat obscured in the general blab about whom Jack Dempsey should fight is the fact that the champion is going to fight Gene Tunney next month, no matter what action the boxing board may take.

Jim Farley has acted all along as if he would be able to prevent Dempsey from fighting Tunney. All he can hope to succeed in doing is to prevent them from fighting in New York state.

Tex Rickard, Jack Dempsey and Billy Gibson, Tunney's manager, all personally assured the United News Monday that they were going ahead with the fight. They want to have it in New York. The champion went to the offices of the commission Monday and presented a renewal of his application for a license to box in this state.

The challenger will do the same Tuesday morning when he arrives from his training camp at Lake Pleasant.

Colonel John J. Phelan has returned from the 60th regiment encampment in time to pass upon the boxers' application before the regular meeting of the boxing commission.

Everyone will be on tip-toe around the Flatiron building, awaiting the word. If Farley announces that Colonel John has granted the applications, New York fans will let out a wild whoop of joy. Dempsey and Tunney will grab their licenses and their hats and depart for their respective training camps on the first train, and all the old familiar bally-hoo that is as much a part of a championship prizefight as pink lemonade is of a circus, will go out throughout the length and breadth of the land.

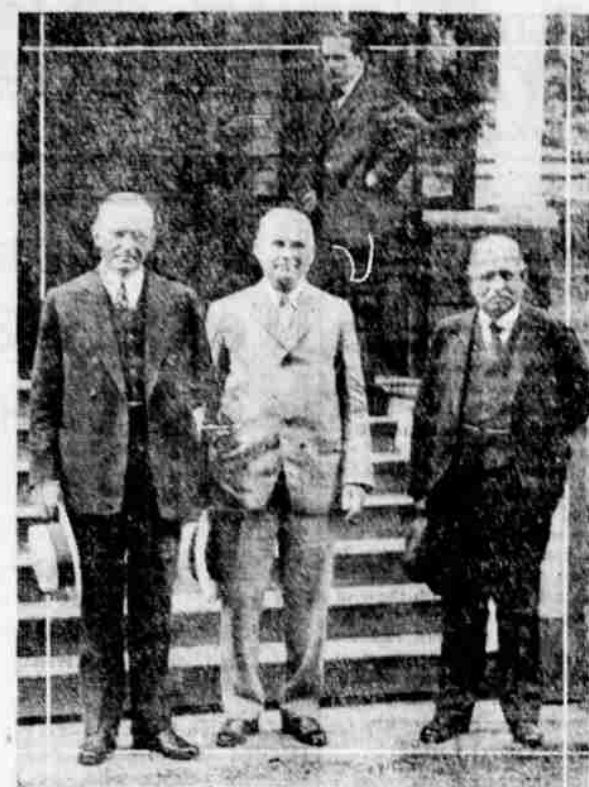

The Phils made seven runs in the first inning of the first game, which they won 7 to 4. Cincinnati pounded three twirlers in the second game and won, 10 to 5.

In a wild ball game at Detroit the Yanks beat the Tigers 9 to 8. Babe Ruth and Tony Laverie hit homers and seven pitchers were battered about. With New York leading 9 to 4, in the ninth the Tigers batted Jones from the box, kept right on hitting Braxton who was rushed to the rescue and finally were stopped by Bob Shawkey, one run short of a tie.

Tris Speaker's homer off Walter Johnson helped the Indians beat Washington 7 to 4.

Walberg held the White Sox to four hits, the Athletics winning 2 to 1.

The Red Sox made 16 hits at St. Louis, where they beat the Browns 7 to 5.

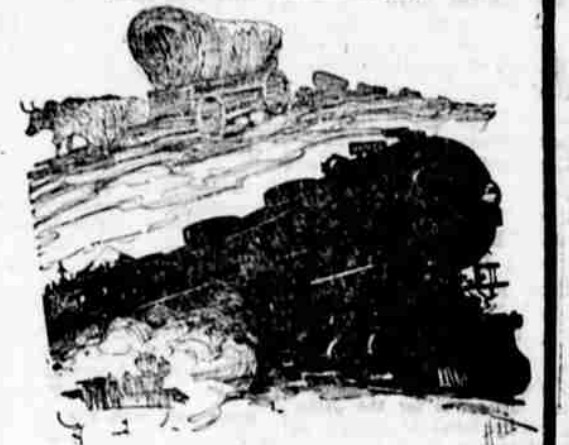
