

Junior Tennis Is Leaning Westward For Championship

CHICAGO, August 10.—(United News)—The Junior tennis championship crown was leaning toward the west tonight after a day of upsets.

The main upset of the day came in the defeat of the ranking player, Henry L. Johnson of Waban, Mass., by Howard Langley of Seattle, 6-1, 1-6, 6-2, in a third round match. Johnny Boeg of Santa Monica whose remarkable service has made him regarded as the West's chief hope, pulled through a tight match with William Cline of Louisville, 5-7, 6-3, 6-3.

William Junior Coen of Kansas City, the favorite in the boys' division, continued to display remarkable tennis, and came through the third round matches with an easy 6-love, 6-love, victory over Emmett Lowery of Indianapolis. The principal upset in the boys' division was the defeat of Harry Moore of White Plains, N. Y., by Snick Lukats of Gary, Ind. Up until the match Moore had been regarded as one of the most likely contenders.

The original field of 76 entrants in the junior division has been cut down to 16.

The Pittsburgh Pirates presented Brooklyn with the ninth consecutive defeat suffered by the Robins during the present invasion of the western clubs of the national league. Lee Meadows held the Robins helpless after the first inning, while Brooklyn contributed eight errors, a season's record, towards their own defeat by a 10 to 2 score.

The Giants obtained undisputed possession of fourth place by again defeating the Cubs, 2 to 0. Frankie Frish's homer broke up a pitching duel between Root and Barnes which lasted until the sixth. Chicago was held to four hits by the New York pitcher.

The Cardinals beat the Braves, 2 to 1 and the Phillies the Reds, 10 to 8.

In the American League, a defeat by the Tigers concluded a successful western trip for the New York Yankees. Although beaten, 5 to 3, the Yankees virtually clinched the 1926 pennant by their showing in the west.

The Indians were unable to hit Dutch Ruether and lost to the Senators, 4 to 1. Home runs by Jacobson and Williams featured the game in which the Browns beat the Red Sox 6 to 4. Eleven innings were required for the Athletics to beat the White Sox 4 to 3 after Mostillinos' homer in the last of the ninth and tied up the game.

Sportsmen Smile As Pheasant Crop Reported Large

PORTLAND, Ore., August 10.—Sportsmen will have the largest crop of Chinese pheasants in years to hunt between October 17 and 24 this fall according to A. F. Averill, state game warden.

Dempsey-Tunney Fight Scheduled For September 16

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(United News)—A heavyweight championship fight between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney at Yankee stadium on September 15 has been assured by the action of the license committee of the New York state athletic commission.

Colonel John J. Phelan came to bat as expected and saved the bout and all its incidental dollars for New York city.

Because the license committee, like the athletic commission, apparently is unable to take any decisive, straight-forward action where this fight is concerned, several details still remain to be cleared up.

1. The heavyweight champion must obtain a license.

2. The condition upon which Colonel Phelan, chairman of the license committee will grant this license to Dempsey is that Jack shall comply with the rules and regulations of the New York athletic commission.

3. The commission, by a two to one vote, already has approved the proposed Dempsey-Tunney match.

4. Therefore, as soon as the champion indicates that he has complied with its rules by accepting Tunney's challenge, the commission will indicate its satisfaction to the license committee, which in turn, will issue Dempsey his license to box in this state.

At its meeting Tuesday afternoon, while the fighters and their managers and followers and Tex Rickard and other celebrities of the boxing world waited anxiously in an adjoining room, the license committee deferred action upon Dempsey's application for his fighting papers.

"Mind you," said Colonel Phelan, who was nervous as a witch at finding himself so much the center of attention and agitation, "this does not mean that we have denied Dempsey a license. Far from it. We merely have deferred action until he complies with the rules which require a champion to defend his title."

"I think if I were Dempsey, I would know what that meant, and what to do about it."

The license committee acted favorably upon Gene Tunney's application for a license, thereby clearing up everything as far as the big challenger was concerned, and enabling Gene to return to his training camp at Speculator, N. Y.

Dempsey will remain in New York city another day and confer with Tex Rickard over the best way to demonstrate to Colonel Phelan's committee that he has the approval of the athletic commission.

This is all a matter of form. The main thing is that the fight is on—scheduled for Yankee stadium, September 16.

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Sylvester Plans Something Great In Fight Treat

Speed is what Matchmaker John Sylvester promises for the next Scandia Ball boxing show, scheduled for Tuesday, August 17.

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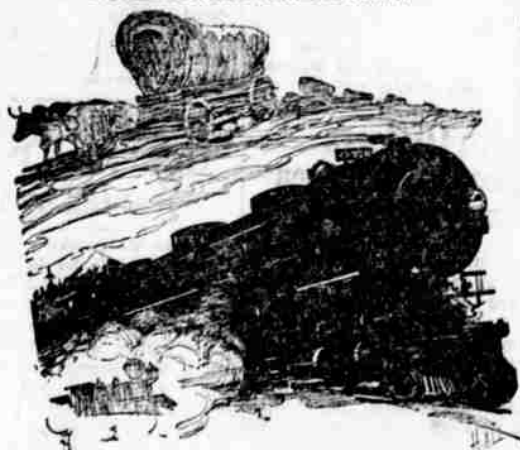
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
