

Senators Begin To Show Life in Defeat of Yanks

The New York Yanks returned to the east Wednesday and dropped both ends of a double header to the Senators. The score in each game was 5 to 4, the second going eleven innings.
Twenty-one hits and 21 runs was the toll the embattled Reds took at Philadelphia. Home runs by Pipp, Hargrave and Walker featured Cincinnati's 21 to 3 victory.
The Pirates were pulled back a full game from their leading position when Yde and Songer failed in the eighth, and Brooklyn beat the world's champions 4 to 2. The Cards gained on the league leaders when Haines shut out the Braves 2 to 0, allowing five hits.
Bush held the Giants to three hits and the Cubs moved back into a tie for fourth place, beating New York 11 to 1.
The White Sox won a 13-inning game from Cleveland 7 to 2. Falk's homer in the 13th being one of the five runs scored by Chicago in the final session. The Tigers easily beat the Browns 4 to 1.

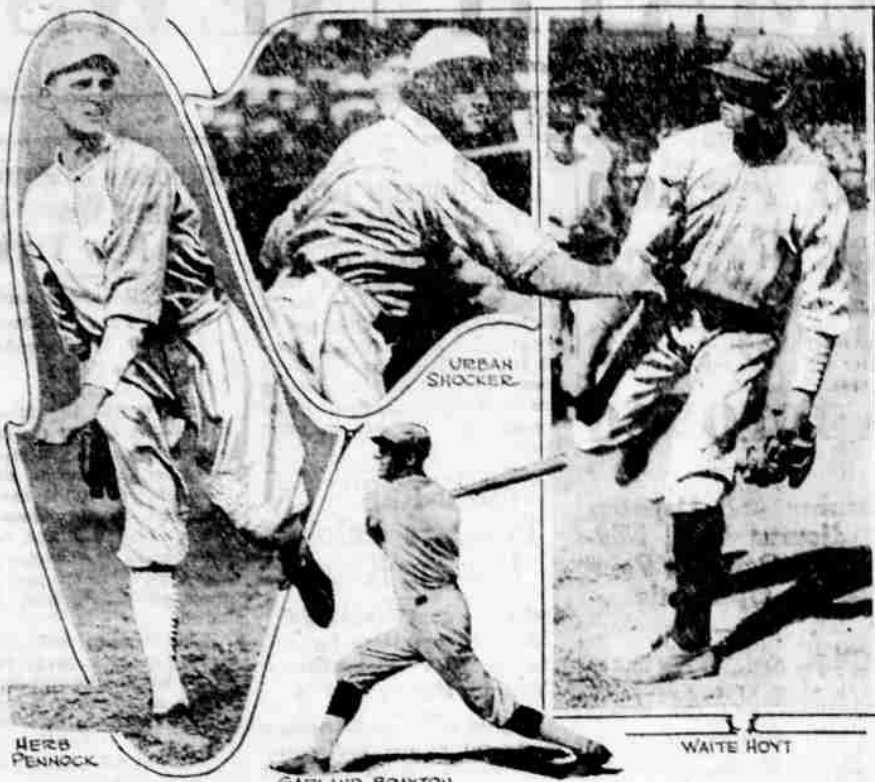
Dempsey-Tunney Fight Assured By Regulation

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—(United News)—Jack Dempsey "will comply with the rules and regulations of the New York state athletic commission" at a special meeting of that body Thursday morning.
When the heavyweight champion has complied thus with the conditions imposed by Colonel John J. Phelan, chairman of the license commission he will receive a license to box in this state.
This is the program mapped out by Tex Rickard, who has taken charge of the ludicrous three-ring circus which the ambiguous vacillation of the boxing board and the license commission has made of the preliminaries of the Dempsey-Tunney fight.
Rickard said Wednesday night he was confident everything would go through without a hitch and that the champion would be able to take the night boat up the river to his training camp within another 24 hours.
It is a good thing for those interested financially in this fight that Rickard seems to know what he is doing, for no one else seems to.
As a business proposition involving millions of dollars, the forthcoming heavyweight championship battle has been the most muddled and mismanaged affair on record. If the fight were to prove as ridiculous as the arrangements Jack and Gene would wear fools' caps and belt each other with bladders while the referee danced the Charleston.

After conferring with Commissioner Muldoon of the boxing board, however, Rickard believes he can lead the whole flock out of its bewilderedness. He and Gene Normie and Dempsey will appear before the athletic commission at 10 a. m. An agreement indicating that the champion has agreed to defend his title against Gene Tunney next month will be added to four contracts signed by Dempsey for fights with Harry Willis. None of these contracts survived the inability of promoters to produce the required money. With Rickard and the agreement to meet Tunney the case is quite the opposite.
Muldoon and Brower, the two commissioners who favor the Tunney fight, are expected by Rickard to indicate their complete satisfaction with Dempsey. After which it would seem to be up to Colonel Phelan to take favorable action on the champion's application for a license.

Catalina Island Swim Is Planned For Miss Ederle

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 11.—(United News)—Now that she has conquered the English Channel, Southern California wants to put Gertrude Ederle to an even greater test.
Plans are under way here to stage an international swimming contest between Long Beach and Catalina Island on Christmas day. Miss Ederle and other famous long-distance swimmers will be invited to compete.
The projected swim would be 22 miles. That would make a distance of two miles more than Gertrude swam in crossing the Channel. Local enthusiasts back of the project insist that contestants will not find the water any colder than that in the English Channel, although the swim is planned for Christmas day.
The proposed contest is being sponsored by the Long Beach and Los Angeles chambers of commerce.

An official dinner tonight at the Swedish consulate is the only formal function planned. Thursday, the party will depart for Hilo to visit Kilauea volcano and will return Sunday night.

Every pitcher has his bad days, and the fact that we lost last Sunday doesn't mean a thing where the future is concerned."

The Pelicans are not at all downcast in the face of a four-way tie in the league standing. They're out for three heavy practices this week, giving the miffs for the remaining struggles. One week from Sunday next, the local team plays Astland on Klamath road, and a week from that date goes to the grass with Grants Pass on the latter's soil.

If the Pelicans win either of the two coming games with Medford and Astland, they will still stand a mighty good chance for first place in the league, and the players aren't forgetting that fact. Confidence runs rampant and the fact that next Sunday's game is to be "Fuller's Game" in honor of the injured Walter Fuller, who is at his home in Dunsmuir with a broken collarbone, will spur the Klamath sluggers on to greater efforts.
