

Reams Golf Club Informal Opening Occurs on Sunday

Overlooking the lower Klamath valley and Klamath river, as it starts on its long, meandering journey to the sea, sits the almost completed clubhouse of the Reams Golf club, east of town on the Keno highway. The new structure is a study in harmony and blends perfectly with the sage-grey hills surrounding it as a background.

In choosing material out of which to build, the contractors turned to the country immediately surrounding the club grounds and found a good building stone. For the fireplace they used a rubble stone that has lain on the hillside for centuries and collected a certain kind of moss that lends the much desired rustic effect which was so necessary to the setting.

The large porch extending across the entire building affords a view of the whole golf course. The building contains living quarters for the caretaker as well as shower and lavatory accommodations for members and guests.

On Sunday when the course will be opened informally for the first time to members and their families, the first two holes will be forbidden for play as the grass is still too young and tender there. Considering the fact that the greens have been seeded only four months they are in fine condition. It is expected that the first and second holes will be ready for use in another month. The grass on the fairways is doing fine, according to Charles Roberts, one of the directors of the club. This has been an unusually bad year in Klamath for the growing of grass as the weather conditions were against growth with the very hot and cold winds, extreme dry months and sudden changes of all kinds.

If it had not been for the complete sprinkling system, consisting of 25 sprinklers manned by an automatic electric pump, things would have been hopeless as far as grass on the greens was concerned for this year. Water for the club house will come from a well which has been sunk for 125 feet into the earth.

It is the plan of the directors to build tennis courts next year and further improve the club grounds by means of a terrace leading down from the club house.

Due to the fact that several members have moved away or dropped out there will be a few memberships on sale the first of the week. As the town grows is the plan of the club to revise its charter and increase the membership to 150 instead of 100 members.

Y., Aug. 13.—(United News)—Helen Wills today was defeated for the second time since her return from abroad when Mrs. Molla Mallory, several times holder of the American tennis title, won a hard fought three set match from the American champion in the semi-final of the New York state women's championships. The scores were 6-8, 4-6, 6-2.

Helen, who about two months ago was operated on for appendicitis while she was in Paris, recently was beaten by Elizabeth Ryan.

After the first set when she showed to best advantage, Miss Wills tired quickly and Mrs. Mallory was able to pass the champion with fast placements.

Mrs. Mallory will meet Mary K. Browne of California in the final round Saturday.

ROSENBERG AND LABARBA WIN THEIR FIGHT

CHICAGO, August 13.—(United News)—Charley "Bill" Rosenberg, bantamweight champion, fought a 10-round draw with Joey Sangor of Milwaukee and Fidei Labarba, flyweight champion, easily won the referee's decision over Emil Paluso of Salt Lake City in the headline bouts of a boxing show at the Cubs' park here tonight. No titles were at stake in either match. Rosenberg and Sangor mixed freely in all rounds and both ended the bout tired and bloody. The referee's decision of a draw was hissed by the fans.

Leo Wax, billed as the Australian welterweight champion, was floored twice in the second round by Clyde Hull of Dallas, Texas. In the third round he was knocked down again and the bout was stopped by the referee.

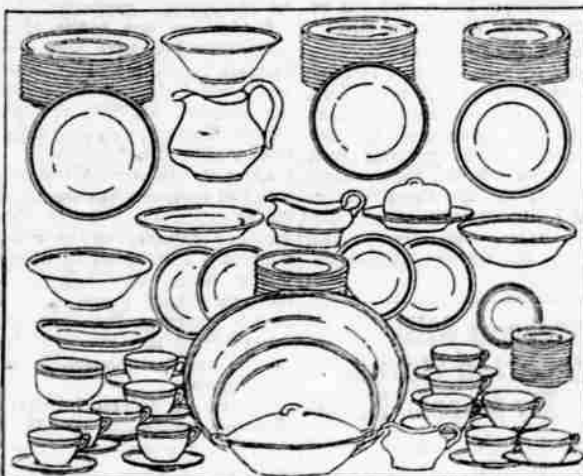
