

Klamath Sportsmen To Meet Monday at Chamber Commerce

Next Monday, August 16, will be regular meeting night for the Klamath Sportsmen's association, at the chamber of commerce at 8 p. m. The officers are in receipt of a communication from State Game Warden E. F. Averill asking for an expression of opinion as to alterations and additions to the existing game laws, and suggests that the association take action regarding this matter and report contemplated changes to the state officers as soon as possible.

The idea of the state authorities is to have the sportsmen's associations of the state make suggestions to the state body these will be acted upon by the state body, and a thorough digest of all suggestions arranged in a comprehensive bill to be presented to the state legislature for action at its 1927 session.

Probably no two sportsmen in the state have identical ideas on this question, but the desire of the state officers is to get the predominant feeling, and to draft a bill that will cover the ideas of the majority, feeling that the average Oregon sportsman is game enough to abide by the decision of the majority.

If you have the interest of the game at heart, attend this meeting and place your ideas before the local body. Everyone will be heard that has any modification or addition to suggest, and the more suggestions submitted to the state body the more that body will have from which to draft a bill acceptable to the sportsmen.

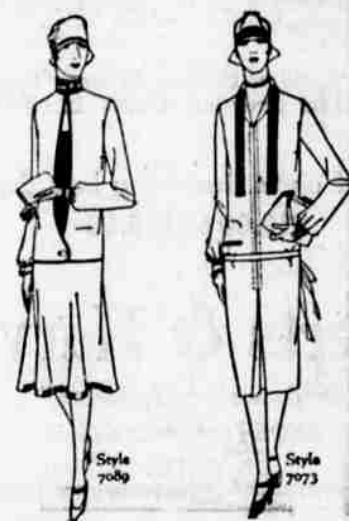
