

FULLER DAY AT FAIR GROUNDS

Benefit Tickets Will Be Offered For Sale to Fans

Walter Fuller Who Was Injured in Game Week Ago is to be Given More Financial Assistance

Fly high, you Pelicans! With all four teams in the league tied for first place, today's games are due to considerably rearrange several sets of percentage figures, and when Klamath ball players take position on the local diamond to tussle with Medford, several hundreds of Pelican fans are going to split the high heavens with pleas for a victory.

At the height of their season, the local team has been drilling hard during the past week and with the breaks falling 50-50, expect to walk off the field this afternoon with a Medford scalp in tow. Following a few weeks of misfortune in the matter of wins, the Pelicans staged a heavy comeback recently which brought them in close proximity with the coveted championship of the league. Nor do they intend, all powers willing, to lose out this late in the running.

Judging from dope out of a badly battered bucket, the Klamath club stands a mighty good chance to walk off with the heavy end of the score today, but they'll have to play hard to do it, for Medford too, has been hitting the ball of late. Duback is still vehement in his avowed convictions that the best talent for the Pelican club is to be found right here at home, and in today's game he will use virtually the same lineup. The players themselves are backing Eddie's opinions to the fullest extent and feel quite confident that the game will be their own.

Montgomery, crack second baseman for the Pelicans, will in all probability take the bench today because of an injured leg, sustained in an accident two weeks ago. Aiken is slated to take the bag for Montgomery, but if the latter seasoned slugger is needed, he may be called into action to slam out a few hits. Duback stated, Aiken however, is not likely to be pulled from his corner of the diamond. Street, utility twirler, is signed for centerfield today, with Sanders and Davidson all set to appear on the mound. After a slump last week, Davidson is expected to stage a heavy come-back today and rout the enemy's batting forces with a variety of tricky tosses. Sanders, who played the best game of his past season last Sunday, should be in the same old hypnotizing form. Between the two, Medford is expected to have a difficult time lining out the score-producers.

Peterson will catch, completing the Pelican battery. The agile Clark will hold down first sack in his usual dependable style, and with the experienced Aiken on second, making it hard for base runners to reach third, and the invincible Duback playing his same old position on the mile-from-home corner, Medford players who do connect with the pill, will probably have a struggle to make it count.

Waita will get everything which comes through shortstop territory today, and supporting the mound in every way possible, will be Mathews and Ellis at field corners. Fans in general will be glad to see the same old faces on the diamond, according to current conversation, and the Pelicans can expect 100 per cent support from the grandstand.

Tennis Tourney East Versus West Draws Attention

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 1.—(United News)—Results of east vs. west matches.

A. H. Chapin, Jr., east, and W. T. Tilden, east, defeated Lionel Ogden and Crausdon Holman, west, 6-2, 7-9, 6-4.

Both Vincent Richards of New York and Little Bill Johnston of San Francisco, are to play on the team which will defend the Davis cup for the United States next month.

William T. Tilden II, national singles champion, will be the third man of the Davis cup team, but upon the outcome of the two important matches Saturday and Sunday, depends the committee's final decision.

The east vs. west matches, which began on the West Side courts Friday have not as yet furnished much of a line on the candidates for the Davis cup team. In the only singles matches to be played Friday, the east triumphed. Alfred Chapin defeated Lionel Ogden 6-2, 6-2, and Vincent Richards beating Ed Shandler 6-3, 6-3.

The courts were soggy, however, after the heavy rainfall and there was little opportunity to get a real size-up of Richards' game.

Two matches, upon which the selection committee plans to base its final decision, are those between Johnston and Tilden here Saturday and between Richards and Tilden at Rye, N. Y. Sunday in the finals of the southern New York championships.

As a special test "Big Bill" and "Little Bill" will play a five set match. The national champion is taking his tennis more seriously since his recent defeat by Richards in the metropolitan championship, but his play in the doubles between the east and west Friday showed that he was far from the Tilden of old.
