Aged Editor Held On Charge Using Mails Improperly

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 16.—(United News)—The scurrilous attack made on Almee Scipple McPherson, famous evangelist, by A. R. Sauer, 76-year-old San Diego editor, was based on the belief that Mrs. McPherson had committed an act of gross immorality and should be censured accordingly.

This in part was the defense offered by Sauer's attorney at a hearing before United States Commissioner Head.

Sauer was held for the federal grand jury on a charge of sending obscene literature through the mails, at the close of the session late today.

"Although there is very serious doubt in the question of probable cause I will have to hold the defendant to answer to the grand jury," Commissioner Head said.

New Viaduct Will Result in Sixth Street Closing

South Sixth street will be closed to traffic within a few days, to allow the Southern Pacific Railway company to prepare for construction on the \$124,000 viaduct to be erected over the tracks at that point. It was decided at city council meeting last night.

According to advice from D. J. Russell, in charge of construction for the S. P. here, preliminary work on the viaduct will begin within a short time. Even now, it was stated, dirt trucks hauling to the fill west of Sixth, are holding up traffic on the street.

In accordance with a suggestion last night, East Main, in preparation for the heavy traffic which the closing of Sixth will send over it, may be narrowed and graded. Oil will probably be placed on this street when relieved of the heavy traffic, and the street be declared a boulevard, closed to trucks. The matter was referred to the street committee with power to act.

Gaines Trial May End Within Next Day at Seattle

SEATTLE, August 16.—(United News)—Mrs. Elizabeth Gaines, wife of the defendant, took the stand late this afternoon in behalf of her husband, Wallace C. Gaines, on trial on a charge of murdering 22-year-old Sylvia Gaines, his daughter by a previous marriage.

Testifying regarding the "New Arctic hotel incident," Mrs. Gaines declared that there was a tacit understanding between her and Sylvia that whichever one happened to be with Gaines when he was intoxicated would take care of him.

The witness was subjected to a merciless cross-examination by Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin.

Dr. Royal B. Tracy, neo-psychiatrist, was one of the defense witnesses. He testified that in his opinion the murder of Sylvia Gaines on the lonely shore of Green lake on the night of June 16 was the work of a fiend.

The sensational trial rapidly neared a close Monday.
