

Tiger Flowers to Risk Title With E. Greb Tonight

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(United News)—A rocky and confident Tiger Flowers will thrust his recently acquired middleweight title within range of the flailing fists of Harry Greb Thursday night in the return bout the negro promised the Pittsburgher when the championship changed hands last winter.

The Georgia deacon completing his training, said he felt sure he would beat Greb "a little bit worse than before."

This seemed to be the opinion of the majority of the experts, who were not persuaded by Harry's gesture of hard training. Most of them believe that the former champion is completely burned out and will prove easy for Flowers.

Harry Greb is one who believes differently. The Pittsburgher is quoted as advising his friends to bet on a knockout. Never satisfied with the decision which transferred the championship to Madison Square Garden six months ago, Harry thinks he has developed sufficient speed and hitting power to flatten the Tiger. The latter has been knocked out seven times already, Greb but once.

PIRATES IN LEAD ALMOST BY HAIR

The Pittsburgh Pirates barely retained their lead in the National league race Wednesday when they divided a double header with the Braves while the Cardinals and Reds were winning.

The Giants beat the Cubs 2 to 1 in 10 innings and again drew up into the first division.

Ray Kremer's pitching and his homer in the second inning beat the Braves 4 to 1 in the curtain raiser at Pittsburgh, but the visitors got the jump in the second game and won 4 to 3, despite the fact that the Corsairs made 14 hits to Boston's seven.

May shut out the Phillies, 3 to 0, and the Robins were easy for Reinhardt at St. Louis, the Cards winning, 6 to 2.

In the only American league game played, the Red Sox defeated the Browns 4 to 2, Ruffing holding St. Louis to five hits.

Dempsey-Tunney to Battle in Quaker City, Says Rickard

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(United News)—The world's heavyweight championship fight between Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney has been transferred from New York to Philadelphia, where it will be held September 23.

Tex Rickard who will promote the bout, announced the change Wednesday night.

The champion and challenger will move their training camps immediately to points near Philadelphia.

The Sesqui-centennial stadium, which will seat 150,000 spectators will be the scene of the fight and Rickard informed the United News that he anticipated close to a \$1,000,000 gate.

No obstacle, such as blocked the promoter's plans for holding the bout at Yankee stadium in New York will be encountered in the Quaker City, for the Pennsylvania state athletic commission, Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania, and Mayor Kendrick of Philadelphia, all have approved the match.

Ma Ferguson Fires Jim From Job as Political Advisor

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 18.—(United News)—Outpointed in her initial effort to secure the gubernatorial nomination, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, or "Ma" as she is called, is making another desperate attempt to save the family political fortunes, this time on the issue of whether once brought her overwhelming victory and the distinction of being the nation's first woman governor.

"Ma" sidestepped the terms of her famous wager with Attorney General Dan Moody which called upon her to retire. Blaming that political error all on her husband, political adviser, "Ma" declared she was her own boss and would not quit.

And she didn't. She entered the run-off primary and for the last two weeks has been stamping the Lone Star state from end to end. She has been shouting her old victorious battle cry of "down with the Ku Klux Klan."

Her defeat at the run-off primary August 28, she warns, will mean victory, not only for Dan Moody, but for the Ku Klux Klan. It is a strange spectacle and there is much interest in this last stand of the Fergusons.

What are her chances? Just now every indication points to a total eclipse of the lady governor's political star.

When she stepped out "on her own," in the face of returns from the first primary she challenged popular opinion, as voiced by her own party, as well as virtually the unanimous opinion of the state press.

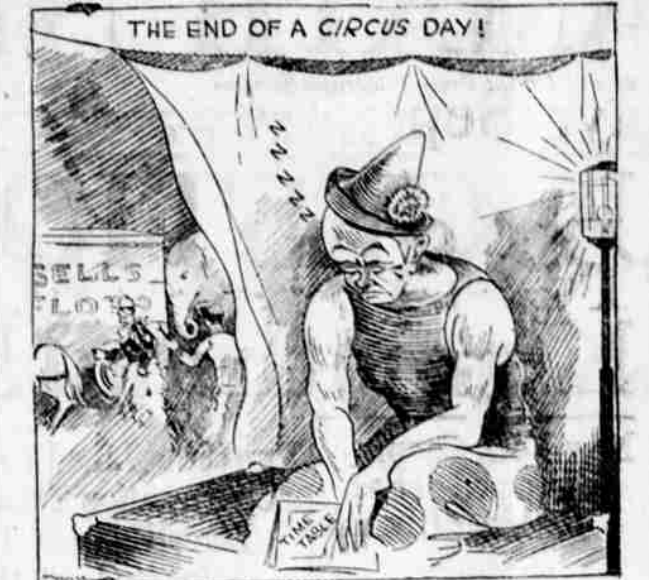

Officers Start Gangland Sweep In Windy City

CHICAGO, August 18.—(United News)—Without the blaze of publicity and extravagant predictions which usually attend such campaigns, the Chicago police department is making its sweep of gangland.

The city and suburban haunts of beer running gangsters are giving their denizens up to the law in greater numbers than ever before.

Smashing and spectacular raids, like those which followed the murder of Assistant State's Attorney William H. McSwiggin, have given way to a quieter and more effective offensive, under direction of Detective Chief Shoemaker. Instead of raiding the gang haunts, Shoemaker's reorganized detective squads merely walk the streets, picking up suspects one at a time, and sending them to headquarters in plain automobiles.

"This kind of business gets results, where running bluecoats and clanging patrol wagons fail," Shoemaker said. "Our men are bringing in from 15 to 25 gangsters a day. The valley is almost depopulated of bad characters."

GOVERNMENT IS OUT CANTON MURDER CASE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, August 18.—(United News)—Federal authorities henceforth will concern themselves only with alleged liquor law violations brought to light by the murder of Don R. Melette, Canton Daily News editor, while officials at Canton, in Stark county, will carry on the murder investigation.

Louis Mazer, formally charged with the slaying will be held until the grand jury, now in session, has reviewed the case.
