

Tiger Flowers Given Decision In Greb Fight

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Aug. 19.—(United News)—The candle that has been burned at both ends cannot be relighted. Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, who played fast and loose with all the rules of training when he was middleweight champion of the world, so that he lost the title to "Tiger" Flowers of Georgia, proved unable to regain his lost laurels in a return bout at Madison Square Garden Thursday night.

Flowers is the only one of his race to hold a world's middleweight championship and easily outpointed Greb in 15 rounds to a decision.

Harry Greb's attempted comeback drew about 10,000 spectators to Madison Square Garden Thursday night. Those who hoped to see the Pittsburgher regain his middleweight title from "Tiger" Flowers matched their cheers against the Georgia deacon's supporters.

A storm of cheers which greeted Greb's appearance in the ring completely eclipsed those which had welcomed the negro champion.

The challenger weighed 159, Flowers 169½. Greb let the negro take the aggressive at the start, smiling and dancing away as Flowers attacked. The negro landed several hard left hooks to the body in the first round. Harry was content to take his chances at infighting, where honors proved to be about even.

The "Tiger" proved the faster and cleaner hitter in the opening sessions, with Greb throwing in an occasional heavy blow to the body. Harry was bleeding from a cut over his left eye in the second round, but had the better of the milling.

Greb missed badly in the third when there was a lot of infighting at which the champion excelled.

By this time the bout was following the course of their previous mill in which Flowers won the title. The negro kept boring in, well covered up with Greb firing away wildly at long range and usually missing.

The Pittsburgher began to lead with his right in the fourth, but the "Tiger" had the best of the milling in close quarters. Flowers was fighting now with confidence and ignoring the challenger's hardest punches as he moved toward Greb's body. The infighting continued in the fifth, with the champion more than holding his own, although it seemed the referee was giving Greb the best of the breaks. Harry second's were working over him hard between rounds; the negro seemed to be in better shape.

Flowers slipped and staggered backwards in the sixth and the crowd yelled for his scalp and cheered Greb as the challenger jumped in with some rough milling. The negro was not hurt, as most of Greb's blows landed on gloves or shoulders. Harry's head opened a slight cut near Flowers' left eye.

The negro showed a flash of sportsmanship in the seventh when he refused to jump in at Greb after the latter had slipped on the wet canvas. This was the slowest round of the fight so far.

There was excitement in the eighth when Flowers landed a one-two punch on the challenger, only to slip and fall to the canvas himself. He rolled against the ropes, bounced up, ran around the ring and resumed fighting. The first furious mixup of the bout came at the end of this frame, when Greb was so intent upon battering the deacon against the ropes that he paid no attention to the bell that ended the round. His seconds ran out and dashed water on him, while Flowers ran to his corner.

American Tennis Big Four Chosen To Defend Cup

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—(United News)—The "big four" of American tennis, R. Norris Williams, William T. Tilden, H. William M. Johnston and Vincent Richards, have been named to defend the Davis cup in the challenge round of 1926.

The selection committee has not announced who will play in the singles matches, but in their announcement Thursday they pointed out that the decision could be deferred until 24 hours before the matches.

"Dick" Williams again has been named captain of the United States team.

Tilden is known to be certain to play in two of the singles matches and the choice of the other singles player lies between Richards and Johnston. If Johnston is elected for the singles, Richards and Williams will be the doubles team, otherwise Tilden and Johnston will be chosen.

Kissel rushed into the street shouting "fire," and with the warning given, faintly. He was the sole occupant of the house at the time of the fire.

The unfortunate Kissel, who declares himself not so unfortunate because his small son was playing away from the house, lost all his possessions, except for a pair of trousers, a few shirts and one or two of his boy's garments. He was unable to save even a pair of shoes. His discharge papers from both the American and French armies were burned.

Laughter from the crowd, evoked by sudden streams of water from the firemen's hose inside the house, wetting spectators, quieted suddenly when a young girl, sobbing hysterically, rushed up to the house from a downtown cafe where she is employed as a waitress. "All that I have is in that burning room," she cried, telling bystanders that even her savings—all paper money—were in a stocking in the room.

A few minutes later, however, three chivalrous young men, encouraged by streams of water which temporarily quieted the flames in the girl's room, rushed inside the house and in a few minutes had rescued all the young woman's clothing, money and suitcases.

One aspiring rescuer, a bathing suit in each hand, rushed out of the house to a shower of water, amid suggestions from the spectators that he don either the red or green suit pronto.

Almost simultaneously with the outbreak of fire in the Baker house, flames burst forth in the kitchen of the George Drummond residence, directly across the street. Drummond and his wife succeeded in putting out the blaze at once, so little damage was sustained. Wiring also caused this fire. Drummond believes, as water pipes to the kitchen sink were shaken loose as if by a shock.

The Baker house formerly stood on the site now occupied by the Elks' temple on Main street, and many years ago was considered one of the show residences of Klamath Falls.

NEW YORK, August 19.—(United News)—With activity surrounding the coming Dempsey-Tunney fight transferred to Philadelphia, interest in New York centered upon Jack Dempsey's offer to fight Harry Wills for a side bet of \$150,000.

The champion posted the money in the form of a certified check.

"Will you cover it, Paddy?" the United News asked Mullins, manager of the negro.

"Sure, I'll put up \$150,000, but the fight must take place before September 23," replied Paddy. As this was obviously absurd, the challenge has not been accepted. William A. Brady, who offered to guarantee Dempsey \$500,000 for a fight with Wills, was not disposed to cover the title holder's bet.

PHILADELPHIA, August 19.—(United News)—Philadelphia, which hasn't known what it means to be the scene of a sporting event of outstanding national interest since its National league baseball team won a pennant eleven years ago, is somewhat dazed by its unexpected good fortune in obtaining the Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship bout.

Although caught unawares the city lost no time in preparing to make the best of its luck. Hotels promptly announced that all reservations were taken for the week of the big fight. Those who had prepared to rent rooms on the occasion of the Sesqui-centennial only to be disappointed by the small number of visitors, dusted off their signs and hung them out hopefully.

Everywhere throughout the city nothing was talked of but the fight. There was little sympathy with opposition which developed from several quarters, where friends of Harry Wills still hoped to block the bout.

With the arrival of Tex Rickard from New York events moved with a swiftness paralyzing to the city.

At a luncheon tendered Rickard by Mayor Kendrick the latter pledged the full resources of the city and the Sesqui-centennial exposition for the success of the fight. The mayor suggested that a gold Sesqui-centennial medal, emblematic of the world's fistie championship be struck off for award to the winner.
