

# KLAMATH EXTENDS GREETING

## Workman Injured in Dynamite Explosion

### Tamping Powder With Iron Bar Instead of Wood Causes Injury of George Thomas

George Thomas, 36, laborer, is lying in the Klamath Valley hospital at the point of death, as the result of a premature dynamite explosion at the rock crusher between Bonanza and Beatty, late Thursday. Thomas was tamping 16 sticks of dynamite into a deep rock crevice and was employing an iron bar instead of a wooden stick for the work. Just as he placed the seventeenth stick in the hole the explosion occurred sending a large piece of the bar partially through his chest.

Burns about the face and hands, and other injuries about the man's body were given first aid by his fellow workmen, but at a late hour last night the attending physician announced his condition critical.

According to witnesses of the accident, Thomas leaned over the hole, peering into the dark crevice to see how the sticks of dynamite were piling up before putting in the last stick. It was then, while using the iron bar, that he was sent hurtling through the air. He fell 20 feet from the explosion. (Continued on Page Two)

Before the kid desperado could snatch his weapon from his shirt, Deputy Sheriff Charles Fiscus, who was "not taking no chances," pumped four bullets into the body of the defiant lad. Three of them landed in Forrest's neck, the other buried itself in his lungs.

## Montana Cowgirl Crushed to Death By Bronc's Hoofs

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—(United News)—The first fatality of the Chicago rodeo occurred Friday evening, when Louise Hartwig, Montana cowgirl, was trampled to death beneath her bronco's hoofs during a thrilling exhibition which was witnessed by more than 12,000 persons at Soldiers field.

Mrs. Hartwig, wife of a Montana rancher, was prepared to leap from Keno, her mount, when she noticed that the cowboys were not ready to catch her. She attempted to regain her hold on the saddle, but it was too late and she went down under the bronco's hoofs.

Keno is known as a bad horse. Several of her friends had begged her not to ride him, but she had insisted that she would be perfectly safe.

## New Oil Lines Terminal Yards Are Being Laid

Work of laying the new oil lines of the Southern Pacific terminal here, began yesterday morning, following the completion of several hundred yards of ditch by the Lorenz digger. An eight-inch main, with a three-inch return pipe and small drain tile, are being placed.

The Lorenz digger is now working directly toward the oil sump near the center of the yards. With excavation for the oil column nearly completed yesterday, it is expected that the system will be installed in the near future.

## NEWS MESSAGE IS TAKEN TO EUGENE BY PILOT YOUNG

Carrying a message from the Klamath News to the Eugene Guard Manager, H. A. Shelton of the Klamath Air Service left yesterday afternoon, dispatched Pilot Franklin Young in an airplane for Eugene. The message is self-explanatory and reads as follows:

## Monster Fighting Craft Is Welcomed

### Seventy Ships of American Navy Enter Golden Gate For Official Visit of Nine Days

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—(United News)—The Golden Gate opened today to the second greatest aggregation of fighting craft that ever entered the harbor, while big guns ashore joined with the city in a boisterous welcome to 70 ships, high officials and 25,000 men of the American battle fleet.

The ten-day welcome to the armada began when the flagship Seattle of Admiral S. S. Robinson, commander in chief of the sea navy, came in the Gate at daybreak, many hours in advance of the U. S. S. California, carrying Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur, and Admiral Hughes, commander of the battle fleet.

It was more than an official visit for Wilbur. It was a return to his own home city, and in celebration he spoke warmly of the aviation program.

"The \$85,000,000 appropriation will put the United States, in top place in naval aviation," he said. "Already experts have been detailed to make a study of the various naval aviation bases, and some important developments may be expected. We are making progress. We have some great plans for expansion. You'll be hearing more about us soon."

The fleet will remain through nine days of the fourth annual Pacific coast championship regatta, in which enlisted men will participate, while officers will be feted ashore and on their vessels.

## Bonanza to Have Sash, Door Plant In Near Future

Bonanza is to have a sash and door factory in the near future, and it is expected that lumber for the new plant will be moved on the proposed site some time next week, according to J. O. Hamaker, for the past 46 years a resident of Bonanza, who was in this city yesterday.

W. H. Kitts, present owner and operator of the Bald Butte mill, has leased a mill site on the old Shook tract in East Bonanza, and will start construction of his new sash and door factory before fall, it was stated. Present plans are to later erect a box factory and saw mill.

With plenty of timber readily available, the site is said to be ideal for the location of a mill as the pond adjacent to the site has never been known to freeze. The pond, according to Hamaker, is fed by warm springs.

Kitts leased his mill site from a syndicate composed of the Horn brothers, A. J. Hickman and J. L. Sparidan, all of Bonanza, who organized for the purpose of throwing open the Shook tract. A portion of the tract is to be devoted to home sites, it was said.
