

### Tourist Travel Shows Increase From Day to Day

Seventeen Thousand Cars are Registered at Chamber of Commerce Since June 1 of the Present Season

Klamath Falls has played the role of host to more than 10,755 persons since June 1 and approximately 17,000 since the first of the year, according to statistics compiled in the Klamath county chamber of commerce through the registration of interstate cars at the Triple A desk.

Since January 1, 1926, 3587 cars have registered at the American Automobile association desk. From January 1 to June 1, 1437 cars have entered the city and from June 1 until August 20, a total of 2150 cars have registered.

According to Mrs. Fred Garich of the Altamont auto park, tourists are best figured at five to a car, and sometimes there are more, sometimes less. At that rate 17,935 persons have been received in Klamath Falls alone, and this does not include several thousand who have registered at other cities upon their entrance into Oregon.

Figures compiled since August 1 show that Fords led the huge caravan that incessantly flowed into Klamath Falls. The number of Fords totaled 87 out of the 549 cars registered. Dodge followed a close second with 73, and third place went to Chevrolet which totaled 65.

Other cars to register this month included Buicks, 56; Studebakers, 47; Star, 23; Nash, 22; Essex, 13; Jewett, 12; Chrysler, 11; Hudson, 10; Overland, 10; Oldsmobile, 10; Cadillac, 9; Oakland, 8; Packard, 7; Hupmobile, 7; Willys-Knight, 7; Franklin, 6.

Other makes of cars to register five or less machines included: Maxwell, Paige, Rickenbacher, Liberty, Reo, Durant, Jordan, Cole, Roamer, Peerless, Dort, Haynes, Flint, Chalmers, Mitchell, Rolls-Royce, Cleveland, Willys-St. Claire, Pontiac, Moon, Stephens, Gardner, Stearns, Elgin, Lexington, Chandler, Lincoln, Garfield. Two Harley Davidson Motorcycles also registered.

### BONANZA RANCHER DIES AT HOSPITAL

Frederick Harrison Gale, 51, for the past four years a rancher of Bonanza, died yesterday morning at a local hospital following a three weeks' illness.

Gale came to Klamath from Reno, Nevada. He was unmarried. He is survived by four brothers, Allen E. of Bonanza, Samuel of Yakima, Washington, Guy of Fort Worth, Tex., and Hugh of San Francisco, and one sister, Mrs. Nellie Quick of Yakima.

Funeral services for Gale will be held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock under the auspices of the Klamath Falls lodge of Elks, all services to be at the graveside in the Bonanza cemetery. Remains are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

### YONNA OIL COMPANY PLANNING TO DRILL

It is reported at Bonanza that drilling operations on oil properties four miles west of there will be resumed this fall, after a period of inactivity, according to M. J. Lytle, Bonanza resident who was in Klamath Falls on business yesterday.

The property in question is that of the Yonna Oil company, he stated, promoted and owned by Bonanza men. A well on the property is already down about 2400 feet and the plan is to go still deeper. All equipment is in shape and ready for the work, Lytle said, which has been going forward intermittently for the past three years.

### Salvation Army Drive Far From Going Over Top

The Salvation Army drive, of which Klamath's quota is \$8000, is going strong, according to Captain Phil Lawton, who yesterday expressed the hope that business men, upon their return from Eugene where they are attending the Trail-to-Rail celebration, would enter into the spirit of the drive and put Klamath's share across.

The campaign which opened here this week is to enable the local corps to "carry on"—to continue with its spiritual activities and to practice its "helping hand" policy in

this and nearby communities. The mayor of Portland recently stated that he considered the presence of The Salvation Army in that city "an economic asset." The chief of police declared that without its presence the prisons would have to be doubled in capacity. Leading churchmen said "they find backsliders, regenerate them, and send them back to our churches."

There is no community which does not need the spiritual influence of religious organizations and the helping hand of well directed social service or welfare work. In every nook and corner of this world, and of this state, there are those who need uplift and regeneration; who need workers trained in the work and the understanding of the destitute, the dependent, the shift-
