Old-Time Boxers Former Days Do Charitable Acts

EBBET'S FIELD, Brooklyn, N. Y., August 20.—(United News)—Johnny Dundee carried the greatest handicap of his long career into the ring at Ebbet's field Friday night, and paid his debt to France by whipping Fred Brettonel, European lightweight champion, with one hand.

With his right hand hanging broken and useless, the aging veteran took the measure of his youthful and rugged opponent, winning the decision at the end of an stirring 10-round contest as has been seen in many a year.

Andre Routsis of France, proved himself a worthy featherweight champion of Europe by administering a beating to Eddie Anderson of Wyoming. The Frenchman won eight of the 10 rounds.

Routsis, who proved to be a veritable little human dynamo, with a wallop in either hand, and a willingness to mix it, made a great hit with the fans by the way he lit into the cowboy Anderson, famed for his ability to take it, had plenty of chance to do so.

It was a fight to bring the crowd to its feet, screaming encouragement as the battlers stood toe to toe, smashing away with both hands, neither giving an inch.

The French champion put Anderson on the ropes and smashed away to the head and body until the westerner could do nothing but hang on.

Paul Berlenbach, former light heavyweight champion of the world, made short work of Francois Charles, who holds the European title in that division. He flew at the bulky Frenchman and began slamming away with left hooks to the body until Charles wilted and went to his knees, without striking a blow.

When the European champion got up, most unwillingly, Paul opened for the jaw with left hooks and again sent Charles helpless to the canvass.

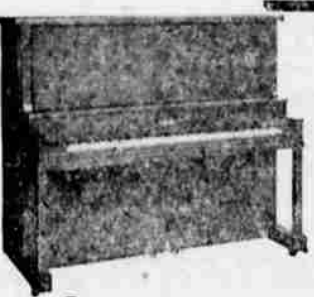
