

Labor Day Fight Card Promises to Be of High Class

Johnny Sylvester, local fight promoter who is handling the Labor Day scraps here for the Klamath Falls Boxing commission, was jubilant last night over the contents of a wire from Bend, advising him that Frankie Doyle will fight in the semi-windup here Labor Day.

Doyle last appeared in the ring here three months ago, and has fought before Klamath fans three times, his popularity increasing with each appearance. On Labor Day he will meet Bobby White, the battler whose go with Cyclone Williams here on the last card, proved better than the main event of the evening. Sylvester is handling White now and the latter's ring generalship is expected to continue in the high favor of Klamath fight supporters.

Doyle has earned for himself the title of windmill, because he starts when the gong clangs, and keeps going until stopped, whether the obstacle is another gong or a harder glove. In the ring the windmill scrapper keeps his arms moving all the time, and they do not fan so much air at that.

"I'm certainly happy to be able to sign Doyle up again," Sylvester declared last night, following receipt of the Bend wire, "for he is a favorite here, and I know the fans will be glad to hear that he's coming back." The promoter was non-committal as to the possible outcome of the semi-windup, declaring that both boys are fast and equally matched. "No matter who wins, the six rounds will be filled with action," he said, "and one or the other will prove supremacy."

Earl Ritchie, who is to stage a grudge fight with Joe Swindler, local prohi, for the main event Labor Day, had another day of log tusseling yesterday and was unable to start his workouts, but will be in Scandia this evening at six o'clock for certain, according to Sylvester. Swindler made his first appearance for training yesterday afternoon and a good sized crowd turned out to watch him get into trim to lick the big lumberjack. But Ritchie says Swindler will get the licking, so the outcome of the battle will probably remain unknown until Labor Day.
