

Cardinals Regain Lead Over Pirate Team of Nationals

The Cards regained the lead in the National league Wednesday but the margin is only a fraction of a game over the Pirates, with the Reds in third place a full game behind.

Both the world's champs and the Reds fought hard pitched battles by the score of 2 to 1. Bob McGraw of Brooklyn proved the Corsairs' nemesis. Although the Robins made but five hits, Bill McKechnie yanked Aldridge in favor of a pinch hitter and later tried Bush and Morrison in the box, without success.

Hugh McQuillan turned in another of his good games in beating the Reds, who outbatted and outfielded the Giants but could not bunch their safeties.

The Cubs won a close one from the Phillies, 3 to 2.

It took the Cardinals eleven innings to beat the Braves, 4 to 3 and acquire first place.

Falling upon Sad Sam Jones in the eighth inning, the Indians scored five runs, which helped them to a 5 to 0 victory over the Yanks, who could do nothing with Uhl.

Detroit, in the course of a double header at Boston, made 30 hits, 10 runs and used up eight Red Sox pitchers in winning both games. The scores were 11 to 4 and 7 to 6.

Dempsey Knocks Sparring Mates Into Cocked Hat

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 25.—Despite rain which kept him indoors, Jack Dempsey put in some lively moments of training Wednesday afternoon. Tilly "Kid" Herman of Bridgeport, Conn., pulled on the pillows and gave the heavyweight champion some real action for a fast round of boxing in the gymnasium of the Elks club here.

From the word "go," Herman sailed into Dempsey, roughing and mixing it with Jack, swapping punches and never backing away. At the end of the round both were breathing hard, although neither was hurt.

"Atta-boy"—that's the way I like 'em," commented the champion.

Dempsey had planned to use his new ring at the dog racing park, but a downpour prevented this.

Little Johnny Saxon, a welterweight from Bridgeport, treated Dempsey as roughly as he could for a round. Then came Herman. Then Big Mike Arnold, who clinched and hung on and seemed chiefly concerned with avoiding punishment. Dempsey didn't like this so well, but took it out on Jimmy Brown, the chocolate-colored middleweight champion of Panama. Jimmy's forte was dancing and jiggling, until Jack caught him with a back-hang swipe which sent the negro nearly through the ropes and out as far as further work was concerned.

Big Bill Tate wrestled a round, and Jack skipped the rope and did his daily dozen.

The champion and his wife, Estelle Taylor, have moved to their bungalow in West Atlantic City, where they are closely guarded by Sergeant Fred Taracott of Chicago.

Dodie Blewett, of the famous athletic family of that name, and Cecily Cunha, announced they would make the attempt to swim the 23 miles of choppy water between Los Angeles harbor and Catalina island. Miss Blewett will make the try next month.

Duke Kahanamoku, the Hawaiian champion, and seven other members of the Los Angeles Athletic Club hope to win the small fortune offered, and the fame and glory that will accompany a successful swim.

Tom Blake, who gained fame in 1924 when he swam the Delaware river will be one of the contestants. Blake will make his attempt within the next two weeks.

It is pointed out here that the swim will be made more difficult than conquering the English channel because the swimmers will be without advice on the conditions encountered.

Wrigley announced his offer will remain open until the feat is accomplished.

New York Yanks Have Pennant in Their Own Pocket

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(United News)—With a pennant in their pocket, the New York Yanks are looking forward and weighing their chances in the world's series. Of the three National league teams still in the running, they fear the Cards most, and hope they will meet the Pirates, the Reds, in the estimation of the American league leaders rank between the two other clubs.

New York fans believe St. Louis has the best chance to win the National league pennant. They base their belief upon the recent slaughter of the Giants by Roger Hornsby's club.

Baseball experts generally, however, lean to the Pirates as most likely to come through in the stretch drive. It is believed that the Reds and Cards cannot maintain the present wild pace which has brought them up to even terms with the world's champions.

Pittsburgh's chances for a second successive pennant admittedly depends upon the early return of Glenn Wright to short field. With the Corsair shortstop back in form, the team should survive the final test better than either the Cards or the Reds.

The Yanks' attitude toward their probable opponents range from that of Babe Ruth, who says: "We can beat any of them," to the cautious Huggins, who warns, "wait until we've won the pennant."

When it comes to comparing the National league contenders, the Yanks size them up this way: "Both the Cards and the Reds have better pitching staffs than Pittsburgh, and in a world's series pitching usually wins. Flint Rhem, Sherry Shindel, Grover Cleveland Alexander and Jesse Haines, with Rheinhart in reserve makes a formidable twirling staff for St. Louis. Carl Mays, Pete Donohue, Adolfo Luque and Eppa Rixey of the Reds would make a strong world's series quartet."

In offensive strength, the Cards surpass the Reds. Therefore, they figure as the more dangerous team. The world's champions have Joe Bush, a former Yank, who would naturally be most eager to beat his former team mates, and the veteran Alrich, Meadows and Kremer have shown good pitching in a world's series when they defeated Washington.

Pittsburgh, like St. Louis, has a better attack than the Reds, but the Yanks insist they can "take" the world's champions with ease.

It is anybody's race in the National league as the three leagues are concerned with the schedule favoring Cincinnati. Jack Hendricks, manager of the Reds insists the fighting spirit of his club has been overlooked by the experts, and one-half of the forthcoming series will be played in Redland park.

Popular sympathy never won a baseball team a pennant, but that sympathy undoubtedly rests with the Cards as far as the fans in other cities around the National league circuit are concerned.

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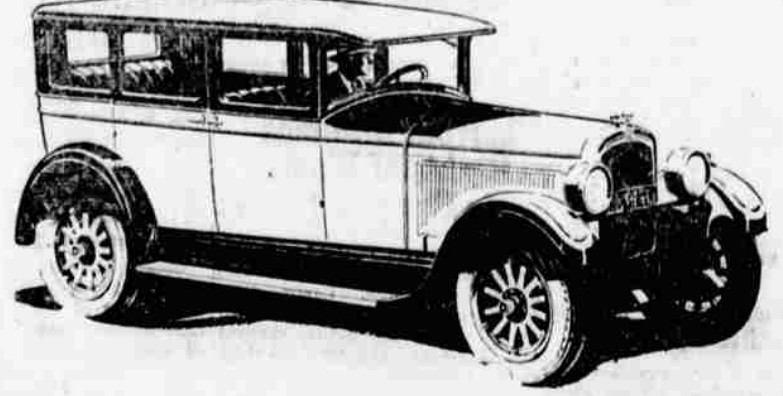
