INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 26.—(United News)—With an entry list that far exceeded all possibilities of accommodation, the first days of play in the western open golfing championship closed tonight in enshrouding darkness with 34 players yet to complete their first rounds. The day's play had been characterized by little in the way of sensational golf. As Chick Evans, Al Watrous and Joe Turnesa holed out on the eighteenth green in almost complete darkness, the score board revealed that only eight men had broken seventy-five during the day's play.

Gene Sarazen with a really brilliant 69 led the field, and the judgment he used in playing the course today made him a heavy favorite to win.

P. O. Hart of Marietta, Ohio, a little known golfer, followed Sarazen with a 70, par golf. The next six were: F. C. Ballett, Milwaukee, and Laurie Ayton, of Chicago, 71 each; Harry Cooper, Kansas City, 74; William Hartshorn, Briarcliff, Ill., 75; Al Espinoza 74; Jack Hutchinson 73.

Chick Evans, Al Watrous and Joe Turnesa, all given a chance to win the tournament, might have had better scores than their 75, 75 and 79 respectively, had they been fortunate enough to have been among the early stragglers. It was almost impossible to see the ball from a distance of a few feet as they completed the eighteenth hole.

Japanese Wallops Tennis Stars in Tennis Cup Games

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 26.—France's dashing Davis cup team ran into a little brown trator at Forest Hills Friday in the person of Takeichi Harada of Japan, who lowered the colors of Rene Lacoste, the holder of the indoor championship of the United States who is rated as the most formidable of French tennis stars.

Harada defeated Lacoste, and outplayed him, raising grave doubts upon the likelihood of the Davis cup leaving the United States this year. The Frenchman played brilliantly at times, but listlessly, as though still feeling the effects of a recent illness, and Harada's versatile attack overwhelmed him.

The match went four sets, the scores being 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 and 9-7.

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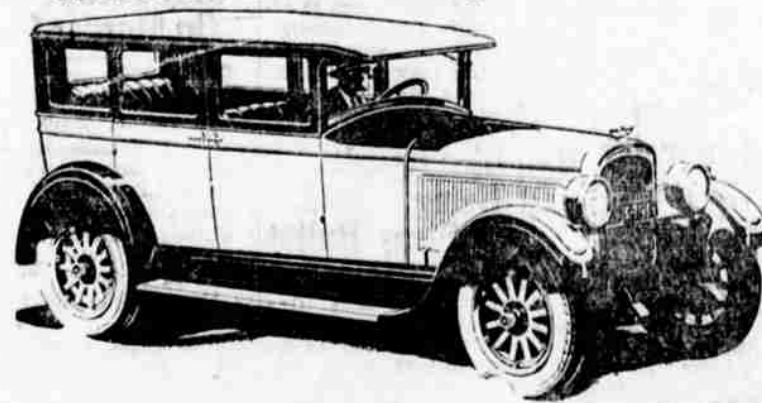
