The Golden Rulers have won eight games and lost six in battles with teams in the Klamath-Siskiyou timber league. Dorris won the championship of the southern division of the timber league. The Golden Rulers defeated Madocel on Decoration Day, 15 to 5. Only recently they defeated Dorris 5 to 4. Now Dorris, with the pick of the teams of northern California is invading Klamath county in an effort to retrieve its baseball name. Dorris is bringing the same team which recently defeated the crack Henley team of the Klamath division of the timber league.

Louis Stewart, Klamath high school boy, who has been on the mound in six of the eight games won by the Golden Rulers, will start the game this afternoon, according to Manager Woodside. Additional players who will be in uniform for today's game, in addition to the regulars, Maston, Kells, Bennett, Beckley, Al Brotherton, Moxley and Stow, will be Buck Jackson and Booth, of Henley, and Jack Franey of Klamath Falls.

All-steel cars, each 70 feet long, make up the Sells-Floto circus train, due here at an early hour tomorrow morning over the Southern Pacific road, coming from Weed, Cal.

Each car is loaded closely, that is every inch of space, practically is crowded, for rail transportation rates these days are such that the larger circuses must get by with as few circus cars as possible. Only the Pullmans, carrying employees and performers, are not crowded.

Familiar scenes on the circus lot at Sixth street and Washburn Way will spring into existence shortly

after daylight if trains arrive on time, and the "big top" and other canvas structures will arise as by magic, so thorough is the circus system and discipline. Activities will continue right up to the hour of the first performance.

As a matter of course the public will be welcome to visit the unloading and the erection of the circus city, so that hundreds will take advantage of the opportunity. The management only expects that visitors will remain out of the charmed circles of activity. There is an education about the circus and no matter how far advanced in life one may be there is a fasci-

ination in watching the unloading and transfer of the outfit to the grounds.

No parade will be given. This is because in most cities traffic conditions are such that it is impossible, so that it is out of the question for the bigger shows to carry a lot of equipment that could be used in only a few towns. However, free attractions on the lot and a longer program more than make up for the loss of the old-time colorful pageant.
