This charge is made to offset the expense of carrying the account on our books, collecting checks deposited, and to cover the cost of supplies furnished.

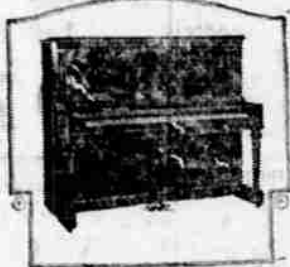
